**THE TWO CONVENTIONS.**

**Only a Temporary Organization in Fayetteville and Chicago.**

FAYETTEVILLE, June 2, 3:47 P. M.  
The Democratic Executive Committee met here to-day. There is a large representation and the little city is full of visitors. The interest is most intense.

At 12 o'clock to day Capt. Chas. D. Myers, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Third Congressional District, called the meeting to order.

Mr. J. W. Shackelford, of Ouslow, was by unanimous consent chosen to act as temporary Chairman, and Messrs. T. W. Strange, of Wilmington, and W. S. Cook, of Fayetteville, were made temporary Secretaries.

A Committee on Organization and Credential, has been appointed, but there are, up to this time, no reports and, as a consequence, no permanent organization has yet been effected.

CHICAGO, 3:45 P. M.—Only a temporary organization has thus far been effected. Geo. F. Hoar, U. S. Senator from Massachusetts, was unanimously elected temporary Chairman. He is now addressing the Convention.

**Sharp Practice.**

Sam Meares, a colored man, living near Meares' Bluff, owned a cow and calf which he had loaned to a neighbor, Sam, wanting his own, demanded them of his friend, and the cow and calf were promptly turned over to him. A day or two afterwards the calf strayed off and was taken up, penned and re-marked by a woman living about five miles distant from Sam. He started out in search of the animal and found it at the woman's house penned up. He let the calf out and drove it home. The woman, thinking she had a case on Sam, swore out a warrant against him for the larceny of a calf. She had several witnesses to identify her calf, but Sam was sharp enough to carry the calf to Court sewed up in gunny bagging. The woman was called up, swore to the calf, and her evidence was corroborated by a dozen witnesses, and Sam then cut the bagging off and asked her to "look at dat." It was a calf, but in no way did it resemble the description of her calf. When the animal was exposed to view, she swore and reiterated, "dat's my calf." Sam remarked "dat he knowed dat de dam niggers would swear to any ting." Sam got his calf and the woman was made to pony up the costs. By his remarkably shrewd expedient of sewing the calf up in bagging, she was unable to give a perfect description and he saved his property.

**That Through Fast Mail.**

There is strong authority for the statement which we are able to make that in all reasonable probability the fast through mail over the Coast Line will be put into operation next month. In this event, the time from New York to Wilmington will be 17 hours and 25 minutes, unless there are some amendments made to the schedule already mapped out. From Weldon to Wilmington it will be something less than five hours, with but three stoppages on the way. **The Mails.**

The welcome rain has come at last and not one moment too soon. It began to fall this morning about half-past 6 o'clock and at this writing, 3 p. m., it is still raining. It has been, in our memory, serves us correctly, over six weeks since we have had a hat-full of rain in this vicinity. The wells and cisterns were giving out and the crops and gardens hereabouts were almost gone when the blessed and reviving rain came. As it was here so has it been in many other sections of the State, but as the indications are to the effect that it has been a pretty general rain we trust that there is as much cause for rejoicing with others as there is with us to-day. This rainfall has been worth already thousands of dollars, and we have not had too much of it yet.

**Census Taker's Questions.**

The following questions will be asked by the enumerators upon their visitations. Heads of families are earnestly requested to have answers correctly prepared, so that no time may be wasted. Heads of families necessarily absent from home should leave the answers prepared for the representatives, so that another visit will not be necessary.

**SCHEDULE 1.**

Questions—Name of each member of family, sex, male or female; age at last birthday, if born within the census year, (beginning June 1, 1879, and ending May 31, 1880); relationship of each person to the head of the family, whether wife, son, daughter, boarder or servant; whether single, married, widowed, divorced or married during the census year; profession, occupation or trade of each person, male or female; number of months each person has been unemployed during the census year; if any person on the day of the enumerator's visit sick or temporarily disabled so as to be unable to attend to ordinary business or duties; if so, what is the disability; are any blind, deaf and dumb, idiotic, insane, maimed, crippled, bedridden or otherwise disabled; which of them attended school during the census year; which of them cannot read; which of them cannot write; place of birth of each person, naming town, county, State or the country if of foreign birth; place of birth of the father; place of birth of the mother.

**SCHEDULE 5.**

With reference to deceased persons who have died during the census year, viz: from June 1, 1879, to May 31, 1880. Age at last birthday; if under one year give months in fractions, thus, 3, 12 or three months; if under one month, give days in fractions; give male or female, single, married, widowed or divorced; place of birth, giving town, county, &c; where was the father born; where was the mother born; profession, occupation, or trade of either person over ten years of age; the month in which the person died; disease or cause of death; how long a resident of the county; if less than one year state months; if the disease was not contracted at place of death, state what place; name of attending physician.

There are other questions relative to the defective and delinquent classes, which will be explained by the enumerator upon visitation. It is not a matter of choice with persons whether they shall or not answer the questions asked by the census taker. They are bound by law to give all the information required by the census law. If any one wilfully fails or refuses to do so, the law says he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and the punishment is fixed at \$100.
