**Making Lumber Out of Straw.**

The inventive ingenuity of a Western  
inventor, who doubtless torments the  
time in the far distant future when  
the forest shall cease to coo the  
hiss and hiss, and the demand for  
lumber shall prove insatiable in excess of  
the supply, has been engaged in devising  
a substitute for the natural product  
of the virgin or the cultivated soil.  
His plan is to use fast fragile vegetable  
straw, and by a peculiar process  
to convert it into a substance as hard  
and indestructible as oak lumber. It  
is claimed that this process converts  
wheat straw into timber which is sus-  
ceptible of as fine a polish and finish  
as mahogany and black walnut, at a  
cost not in excess of that of the best  
oak lumber. The straw is first manu-  
factured by the ordinary paper mill  
process into strawboard, and a suffi-  
cient number of sheets of the right  
size are taken to make the required  
timber. They are soaked and softened  
in a chemical solution, which is, of  
course, the inventor's secret. After  
the fibre of the pasteboard is suffi-  
ciently saturated, the pile of sheets  
is pressed between a series of rollers,  
which consolidates them so that when  
dried the whole is a hard stick. It is  
also claimed that the process renders  
this wood substitute impervious to  
water, and the chemicals used are  
such as to make it fire-proof. But the  
sanguine inventor has only made sam-  
ples thus far.

**Kallich to the Churches.**

Mayor Kallich, of San Francisco,  
lately made an address to the Baptist  
congregation of which he is pastor, in  
reply to those Baptist churches which  
had proposed to put him on trial. He  
was remarkably defiant. Evidently,  
he said, was the cause of the attacks on  
him. He had built up a church larger  
than all the others of the same denomina-  
tion in San Francisco combined,  
and his fellow clergymen hated him  
for that. Of the Baptist convention,  
which had voted to take up his case,  
he said: "Formerly, when I looked  
around the conventions, I was pleased  
to see friends. Judge, then, of my  
surprise when I found those places oc-  
cupied by every man who ever had  
any grievance or grudge against me.  
Every man specimen of a minister  
was there; every man I ran against  
for an office in the convention and beat  
and made sore was there. Why, there  
were men in silk hats and swallow tails  
who never had any money, and where  
they got it from, who can tell? Yes,  
there were gathered the pimps and  
panderers to do me a little harm, and  
for some time it looked as if they  
would do it; but the Lord delivered  
me from the mouth of the lion and He  
will do it and free me from their per-  
secutions, and prepare me for His  
heavenly kingdom.

**A Tough Story to Swallow.**

There is said to be a French babe,  
aged six months, born at Cherbourg,  
the name of whose neck has the singu-  
lar gift of producing an uninter-  
rupted succession of feathers. Twenty-  
three have already sprouted, reached  
maturity, and fallen off, to be care-  
fully stored away by the infant's father,  
a workman, whose fortune may be  
considered made if the amazing story  
turns out correct. The manner in  
which these feathers grow is thus  
described: A pimple forms on the  
side of the neck, quite close to the  
roots of the hair. At the expiration  
of a certain time the pimple blossoms  
into a feather, the child, at the mo-  
ment when it appears, seeming to ex-  
perience a slight uneasiness. The  
feather, which is curved and gilded,  
attains, when fully grown, from ten to  
twelve centimeters in length. When  
it falls a few drops of a whitish color  
issues from the pimple, which then  
heals, leaving no trace of its existence  
for awhile, until another appears, in-  
closing the germ of another feather.  
A curious circumstance, says the  
Cherbourg paper, is that the feather  
remains six days on the infant's neck  
when fully grown before falling, and  
that its successor takes as many days to  
sprout as its predecessor to reach matu-  
rity. The father of the phenomena child  
intends taking it to Paris in order to  
ask science to investigate the cause of  
this freak of nature.

**Railroad Leases.**

There are at the present time in the  
United States between 400 and 500  
railroads held and operated under  
lease, and representing about one-  
fourth of the entire railroad mileage  
of the country. It is probable that  
very few, if any, of the charters contain  
the direct authority to lease. The  
companies have exercised it solely on  
the assumption that the right to lease  
or sell was a necessary incident of own-  
ership. There is no corporation  
which this decision touches more  
heavily than the Pennsylvania Railroad  
Company, so large is the number of  
railroads directly or indirectly con-  
trolled by this company, they con-  
trolling an aggregate length of 6,872  
miles, of which only 430 miles are  
actually owned by the company. The  
recent decision of the United States  
Supreme Court will unsettle these
