Our Next Congressman.

John W. Shackelford, Esq., the candi-
date for Representative to Congress se-
lected by the Congressional Convention at
Fayetteville for this Congressional District,
arrived on the steamer *A. P. Hart*, this
morning, from Fayetteville, and has taken
rooms at the Purcell House. He is accom-
panied by the Onslow delegate, and
during the day has held receptions for the
many friends who have called to pay their
respects and offer him their congratulations.

Mr. Shackelford was born in Onslow
county in this State, and is now about
thirty-six years of age. He is a farmer,
married, but has no children. Although
not a graduate, he has had the advantages
of the best English schools. Was in the
Confederate army, having enlisted when
a mere lad as a private in the Third North
Carolina Cavalry, and was taken prisoner
near Washington in this State in the
Spring of 1864, and was confined for
nearly a year in a northern prison.

In 1872 Mr. Shackelford was a member
of the lower house of the General Assem-
bly, and in 1878 was elected State
Senator from the Senatorial District
embracing the counties of Onslow, Jones
and Carteret. He was regarded as a
useful member in each branch of the
Assembly, winning the esteem and confi-
dence of his associates in both houses.

Recently he has been prominently named
as a candidate for the office of Secretary
of State.

This, in brief, is a biography of our can-
didate for Representative to Congress.
He is a man to whom no true Democrat
can object, but upon whom all can and
will unite, and one whom the Democracy
of the Third Congressional District of
North Carolina will elect as their Repre-
sentative to Congress by a majority of
at least 1,500 good and true Democratic
votes.

BUT LITTLE PROGRESS MADE.
No Approach to Balloting as Yet

CHICAGO June 4—3 P. M.
The Rules of the House of Congress
have been adopted, also the five minutes
rule.

The Committee on Credentials recom-
mended the seating of delegates headed
by Warmouth.

Ryder, of Alabama, recommended a
seat, but as he refuses to obey instructions,
the State was instructed to vote as a
unit.

Contesting delegates from the Seventh
District of Alabama were admitted.

Contestants from the First, Third,
Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Ninth, Tenth,
Thirteenth and Seventeenth Districts of
Illinois were admitted.

Ten delegates of the Second and Third
Districts of Kansas were admitted, but
only allowed 6 votes.

Got Back Safe.
With one or two exceptions the war-
worn-veterans have all returned. The
steamers *D. Marchison* and *A. P. Hart*
arrived at their wharves this morning,
bringing their precious cargoes of used-
up politicians. The boats rounded to
amid the flapping of flags and the inspir-
ing strains of music. The streets and
the hotels have been full of strangers
during the day, and the all exciting topic
of conversation has been the Conven-
tion and the deliberations of the party.
The nomination of Mr. Shackelford seems
to give general satisfaction.

Local Ministers' Conference.
The local minister's conference and
campmeeting will be held at Rutherford
College, commencing July 21st. The
local conference is now a delegated body
consisting of two or more delegates from
each elder's district. Rev. Z. W. Hep-
tinstall is the president and L. Branson,
secretary. The conference was perma-
nently established in 1870, since which
time it has held regular meetings annual-
ly. It represents the local ministers in
this State—about 300 in number. This
is a body of energetic workers, peculiar
to Methodism. They do a large amount
of missionary work without expense to
the Church.

The last annual meeting was held at
Clinton in October.

**Reduced Fares for Delegates to the
State Convention.**
The following reduced rates for dele-
gates to the Democratic State Convention
have been agreed to by the companies
mentioned, and publication of the same
is made by authority of Capt. S. A.
Aebe, Chairman of the State Executive
Committee:

The Western North Carolina Railroad
Company; the Raleigh and Gaston Rail-
road Company, the Raleigh and Augusta
Air Line Railroad Company; the Seaboard
and Roanoke Railroad Company; the
Spartanburg and Asheville Railroad Com-
pany; the Wilmington and Weldon
Railroad Company, and the Wilmington,
Columbia and Augusta Railroad Com-
pany will charge three cents a mile each
way.

The Carolina Central Railway Company
2 1/2 cents a mile each way, and \$7.85 from
Charlotte.

The Atlantic, Tennessee and Ohio
Railroad Company 4 cents a mile one
way for the round trip.

The steamboat companies on the Cape
Fear half rates.

The Atlanta and Charlotte Air Line one
fare; will return delegates free on printed
certificate of attendance.

The Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley
Railroad Company one fare, round trip.

The Atlantic and North Carolina Rail-
road Company 6 cents a mile one way for
the round trip.

The Richmond and Danville Railroad
Company 8 cents a mile one way for the
round trip, and \$9.00 from Charlotte.
Tickets good over this line for five days.
Certificate on back of ticket must be sig-
ned by the secretary of the convention.
