**The Congressional Convention.**  
We yield much of our local space to-day to the publication of the following report of the proceedings of the Congressional Convention held in Fayetteville last Wednesday, which we take from the columns of the Fayetteville Examiner:

The Convention was called to order by Mr. C. D. Myers, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the 3rd District at 12 o'clock, p. m., pursuant to notice.  
On organizing the Convention, Capt. Myers called to the chair Mr. J. W. Shackelford, of Onslow, as temporary chairman, and Messrs. W. T. Strange and W. S. Cook were named as secretaries.  
Mr. Shackelford addressed the convention, urging the duty of good Democrats in the coming campaign, and in promotion of present harmony. He was loudly applauded.

The convention was then declared ready for business.  
By Mr. Cowan, of Columbus:  
**Resolved,** That if there be contesting delegations here, that they be allowed seats on the floor, but cannot participate in the proceedings until their claims are properly considered.  
**Adopted.**  
By Mr. Ellis, of Columbus:  
**Resolved,** That upon presentation of credentials, the committee be allowed forty minutes to decide, and the Convention be allowed only thirty minutes to debate. The resolution was adopted.  
The following resolution was also adopted:  
**Resolved,** That each county shall vote the gubernatorial vote of 1876, and that the two-thirds rule be adopted according to precedent in nominating various candidates; on other questions the majority to prevail.

By Mr. Richardson, of Columbus:  
**Resolved,** That the Secretary call the roll and the delegates select from each county one to serve on committee on permanent organization, and one to serve on committee for credentials.  
**Adopted.**  
The various delegations then reported as follows:  
Committee on Permanent Organization—Messrs. McDowell, of Bladen; Arendell, of Carteret; High, of Columbus; Shaw, of Cumberland; Worthly, of Moore; Porter, of Pender; Carr, of Sampson; Moore, of Duplin; Stewart, of Harnett; King, of Onslow, and Fishballe, of New Hanover.  
Committee on Credentials—Messrs. King, of Onslow; Richardson, of Columbus; Alderman, of Cumberland; Black, of Moore; Satchwell, of Pender; Royal, of Sampson; Nicholson, of Duplin; Shaw, of Harnett; Huggins, of Onslow, and Moore of Brunswick.

The committee retired to deliberate.  
On motion of Mr. Bernard, the convention adjourned until half-past two p. m.  
**AFTERNOON SESSION.**  
The Convention was called to order, and the Chairman announced reports of committees in order. The committee on Credentials asked for another hour to make their report. Granted.  
On motion of Mr. Jacobi, of New Hanover, the Convention adjourned to reassemble at 5 p. m.

Convention re-assembled. The committee on Credentials reported that the regular delegates be admitted. There was a minority report. The former was adopted after a debate of one hour in which Messrs. McLean, Carr, Myrover, D. K. McKee, Ellis, Bernard, Porter and Chinis participated.  
The convention then took a recess of an hour.

**EVENING SESSION.**  
Convention called to order. Dr. Satchwell, chairman of committee on Permanent Organization, put in nomination for chairman Major C. W. McClammy, of Pender. He was elected by acclamation.  
Maj. McClammy in response to a call, spoke, thanking the Convention for the compliment paid him. Messrs. Thom's W. Strange and W. S. Cook were made secretaries.  
By Mr. McLean:  
**Resolved,** That the thanks of this Convention be tendered to the Hon. J. W. Shackelford for his fairness and impartiality in presiding as temporary chairman.

**Adopted.**  
The chairman then announced that nominations were in order.  
Capt. John W. Ellis put in nomination Maj. Chas. M. Stedman, of New Hanover.  
Mr. J. H. Myrover placed in nomination Hon. A. A. McKoy, of Sampson.  
Mr. D. B. Nicholson nominated Col. Wm. A. Allen, of Duplin.  
Mr. Davis placed in nomination Mr. Jas. G. Scott, of Onslow.  
Mr. McLean spoke, regarding the nomination of Judge McKoy. He paid a tribute to Col. Waddell, which was received with cheers.

The balloting then commenced. Maj. Stedman led for the first 18 ballots, having more than a majority, but not two-thirds of the delegates. He then began to weaken, and Mr. Ellis withdrew his name from the Congressional race.  
Mr. N. A. Stedman, Jr. put in nomination Maj. McClammy.  
Mr. D. H. McLean re-nominated Col. W. A. Allen, of Duplin.  
Maj. McClammy withdrew his name, and spoke in advocacy of the claims of Maj. Stedman as a choice of the majority.  
Mr. W. E. Murchison placed in nomination

for D. H. McLean, of Harnett. Mr. McLean, after receiving a handsome vote, withdrew his name.  
The balloting continued with various shifts of fortune. Finally, on the 32d ballot, N. W. Hanover, after casting the vote, changed it, and this nominated Mr. J. W. Shackelford, he having received over two-thirds of the entire vote. On motion, the nomination was made unanimous.

There was the wildst enthusiasm. Mr. Shackelford was called by the crowd and addressed them briefly, thanking the convention for the honor conferred on him, and promising success in the campaign.  
Mr. D. H. McLean was declared Elector for this District.  
The delegates to Cincinnati Convention were Chas. M. Stedman and W. F. Howard. Alternate—J. H. Micks.  
On motion, the Convention adjourned sine die.
