The *Raleigh Observer* says that the
supply of vegetables furnished that
market now are received principally from
this city and that they are of good qual-
ities. As a matter of interest to shippers
here we quote prices at retail:
New Irish potatoes, 60c per bushel;
snaps, 60c; green peas, about the last,
25c; cabbage, 10c @ 20c per head; squashes
40c per dozen; cucumbers 40c per dozen.

and lots of time and patience.

From the Past.

The *New York Sun* records the death
recently, at Newport, R. I., of Rev. Jacob
Frieze, at the ripe age of 91 year.

There are a few—but a very few—of
our readers who will remember the name
or can recall the person of the deceased.
More than half-a-century ago Mr. Frieze
was a resident of Wilmington. He was a
Universalist then and preached for a num-
ber of successive Sundays in the old
Baptist Church, then located on the High
hill on the East side of Front street, be-
tween Ann and Nun. There being no
Baptist minister resident here at that
time, Mr. Frieze, at the request
of a number of prominent citizens, some
of whom professed a belief in the doc-
trines taught by Mr. Frieze, was allowed
the use of the church edifice in which to
preach. During his residence here, about
the year 1824, he established a news-
paper called the *Liberalist*, in which he
was backed and sustained by men of means
but which did not exist very long. Not
long after Mr. Frieze left Wilmington,
and thus, more than fifty years after, we
find his death recorded.

EIGHTH BALLOTS AND NO NOMINATION.

The Lines Strongly Drawn.
CHICAGO, June 7.—Balloting began to-
day not long after the Convention was
called to order. The lines are closely
drawn as the ballots will show. Yesterday
was passed in waitlike preparations for to-
day's encounter. Grant and Blaine lead
the field, Sherman, Edmunds, Washburn
and Windom having been distanced on the
first ballot. The voting has been close
throughout and up to this time,
2:30 p. m. but little variation has been
shown.

There was intense excitement through-
out the vast hall as the first ballot was
taken which culminated when the result
was announced. On it Grant had 304;
Blaine, 284; Sherman, 93; Edmunds, 84;
Windom, 30. This ran, with very little
variation, to the 8th ballot when Grant
polled 306 votes and on the 9th ballot he
secured 308, which is the highest he has
thus far received.

over.

of tax was not granted.
