ment ranging from two to ten years.

The Up Country Crops.

We learn that the crops on the line of
the Cape Fear, between here and Fayette-
ville, are in a very flourishing condition.
Although there has not been rain enough
to materially increase the depth of water
in the river there has been enough occa-
sional rainfall to make all kinds of vege-
tation thrive and grow as fast as the heart
could wish.

The force of State troops has been re-
duced considerably since the last report
of the Adjutant General. The strength
of the Guard now is: First Regiment,
ten companies; Second Regiment, nine
companies; Third Regiment, six com-
panies; Second Battalion, five companies.
These with one company of artillery and
one of cavalry, compose the force of
white troops. Of colored troops the
Fourth Battalion has seven companies,
and the Fifth Battalion two companies.

Important Industry.
To those who are not acquainted with
the facts of the business, the amount of
work turned out annually by Messrs. Al-
taffer, Price & Co. would seem incredible.
It is supposed by some that the business
of this firm extends only to the manufac-
ture of doors, sash and blinds, while in
fact they do a large amount of scroll and
lathe work and dressing lumber in addi-
tion. They also manufacture large quanti-
ties of packing boxes and vegetable crates,
and they have recently received an order
for a large number of battery boxes for
the Telephone Company, both to be used
here and to be shipped to other points,
some of them to go as far west as Tennessee.
It will be remembered that they were
burned out by the disastrous fire at
Messrs. Colville & Taylor's mill last No-
vember. They commenced again in Feb-
ruary last with new and improved ma-
chinery, and they now give constant em-
ployment to about forty hands all told,
about equally divided between whites
and colored. The number of hands calls
for about \$200 on the weekly pay roll of
the firm, and they handle about 1,000,-
000 feet of lumber annually. The prod-
ucts of their labor are sold on the lines of
all the railroads which radiate from this
city, far into the interior of the State and
to South Carolina, as well as in the coun-
try bordering upon the Cape Fear and its
tributaries.

The lumber used in the manufacture of
the different articles is all thoroughly
seasoned and kiln dried in an apartment
prepared for the purpose where by the
introduction of steam through a heater
having about 1,000 feet of pipe, they can
secure a temperature of 200 degrees.
Every department is supplied with the
best and most approved machinery, and
the firm is constantly on the alert for any
new device or invention which will
lighten, cheapen or expedite the labor.

City Court.
The first case called this morning was
W. H. Moore and J. C. Smith, two
prominent colored Radical politicians in
the city in the heyday of "power,"
but now, alas! only common folks like
other mortals of the same persuasion,
their prestige and influence having de-
parted forever.

Moore submitted and was released up-
on payment of the costs and Smith was
fined \$5 and costs, all of which we have
the authority of the Chief of Police for
saying was settled; we presume, of
course, the cash was paid.

Jane Fulford, colored, was arraigned
for disorderly conduct on Saturday night.
The defendant having been locked up
since Saturday night and having her little
child with her, the Court was moved to
compassion and judgment was suspended
in the case.

Primus DeLeon, a colored huckster and
dealer in vegetables, not only declined on
Saturday last to move his cart when
directed so to do, but was very insolent
and abusive, whereupon he was escorted
to the guard house by a Knight of the
Club, to repose until to-day, and after
an interview with the Mayor this morn-
ing was sent below to repose again for
the short space of thirty days in a quiet
little cell, in default of payment of a \$50
fine. This finished the business and the
court adjourned.

timore is reported as being in circulation, pur-
porting to be one of the series of 1875, and
printed on excellent imitation of govern-
ment paper. The plate is one from which
was printed the \$100 counterfeit on the
Pittsburg National Bank of Commerce.
The Treasury Department advises the re-
fusal of all \$100 bills on the Baltimore
bank until they have been examined by
an expert.
