CINCINNATI.

THE ROLL OF STATES CALL D
Bayard, Field, Hancock, Morrison, Hendricks and Thurman Placed in Nomination.

CINCINNATI June 25—4 P. M.
Committee on Credentials reported adversely upon the claim of the Tammamy delegation to a voice in the convention but admitted them to seats upon the floor.

The committee on resolutions and platform not being ready to report, a motion was made to proceed to a call of the States for nominations.

When California was reached Mr. McElrath offered the name of Judge Field. His nomination was seconded by Colorado when that State was called.

At the call of Delaware Hon. George Gray put in nomination Hon. Thomas F. Bayard, which was received with unbounded applause, both the delegates on the floor and the spectators in the galleries rising and hailing the announcement with prolonged cheers.

When Illinois was called, Mr. Marshall put in nomination Hon. William R. Morrison of that State.

When Indiana was reached, Senator Dan. Voorhees placed in nomination Hon. Thomas A. Hendricks, of that State. Massachusetts seconded the nomination of Senator Bayard, of Delaware.

When New York was reached, the Chairman of the delegation requested that the State might be passed.

When Ohio was reached, Mr. McGeve y placed in nomination Hon. Allen G. Thurman, of that State.

When Pennsylvania was reached, Mr. Dougherty placed in nomination General Winfield Scott Hancock, of that State. The announcement of his name was received with great applause.

4:30 P. M.

When South Carolina was reached there were stentorian calls for Senator Hampton, who advanced upon the platform and in behalf of his State seconded the nomination of Thomas F. Bayard. He is now addressing the Convention.

Vermont seconded the nomination of Hancock and Virginia seconded that of Field.

[At this point we are compelled to close. The candidates may be considered as having all been named. Balloting is the next thing in order but it is impossible to say when a nomination will be effected. It may be to-night and may not be until to-morrow.—ED. REVIEW.]

How About it?
As long as the city authorities are keeping the old market building standing in the centre of one of the principal thoroughfares of the city for the benefit of three or four old colored women, who run cooking stalls and booths, we think that they should certainly keep the old disgrace in thorough order. Use of salt.

In many cases of disordered stomach, a teaspoonful of salt is a certain cure. In the violent internal aching, termed colic, add a teaspoonful of salt to a pint of cold water, drink it and go to bed; it is one of the speediest and best remedies known. The same will revive a person who seems almost dead from receiving a fall, etc. In an apopleptic fit, no time should be lost in pouring down salt water; if sufficient sensibility remains to allow of swallowing; if not, the head must be sponged with cold water until the senses return when salt will completely restore the patient from his lethargy. In a fit, the feet should be placed in warm water with mustard added, and the legs briskly rubbed, all bandages removed from the neck, and a cool apartment procured if possible. In many cases of bleeding at the lungs, when other remedies fail, two teaspoonfuls of salt completely stays the blood. In the case of a bite from a mad dog wash the place with strong brine for an hour, then bind on some salt with a rag. In toothache, warm salt and water held to the part, and renewed two or three times will relieve in most cases. If the teeth be covered with tartar, wash twice a day with salt and water. In swelled neck, wash the place with brine drink twice a day, also, until cured. Salt will expel worms if used in food in a moderate degree and aid digestion, but salt meat is injurious if used much.

Grass hats of unmistakable hay color are the rustic mode this Summer. How nice to be able to say "this Summer," with another twist of the shawl about one's shoulders! The hats are trimmed according to individual fancy, with a cluster of plush cherries and strawberries in wool, a wreath of crows embroidery, or an Ophelia chaplet of dried feather grass and wild oats.
