City Court.
Mary Eliza Lively, a guilty hued dam-
sel who is a habitue of Paddy's Hollow,
besides being a frequent attendant at the
Mayor's levees and upon the Criminal
Court, was arraigned this morning upon
the charge of being drunk and disorderly
and resisting the police. From the testi-
mony of officers Grant and Moore the de-
fendant was drunk and very disorderly on
last Thursday night, about 11 o'clock,
and when spoken to by the policeman on
that boat replied by cursing and abusing
the whole police force and defying them
to arrest her, and when she was arrested
fought and bit the officer resisting the
arrest so strenuously that he felt com-
pelled to use his club, and struck her a
blow which inflicted a wound on the
head from which the blood flowed quite
profusely. The defendant then raised a
small sized pandemonium all the way to
the Guard House, while the air was filled
with the most horrid imprecations and
oaths ever uttered, the noise being dis-
tinctly heard for squares around. After
hearing the evidence His Honor remarked
that he would make it pretty lively for
the defendant for the next sixty days and
see if he couldn't cure her. Upon the
charge of being drunk and disorderly a
sentence of thirty days imprisonment
was passed, and for resisting the police
another thirty days was given, making in
all sixty days, or the balance of the sum-
mer, which Mary Eliza Lively will spend
in the C. P.

While the above case was being tried a
telephone came that that there was a dis-
turbance on the corner of Mulberry and
Sixth streets. Two policemen were dis-
patched thither, and the Court adjourned.
Shortly after the adjournment, however,
Sergeant Davis brought in a colored wo-
man by the name of Lucy Fisher, charged
with disorderly conduct. His Honor took
his seat again and proceeded to try the
case. The testimony of officer Davis was
that the woman was in the street acting
in a very disorderly way and talking in a
very loud and boisterous manner, causing
undue excitement in the neighborhood. A
gentleman living in the neighborhood testi-
fied that the defendant had on several
occasions before disturbed and alarmed
the neighborhood in this same way, and
that on this occasion she was using very
vile language and rendering herself a
nuisance to every one around. The May-
or said \$10 or ten days and Lucy Fisher
went below. This finished the second
docket and the Court adjourned.

**CALL OF THE DEMOCRATIC

**The Larger Planets—Their Perihel-
ion and Conjectures as to the Ef-
fect.**

There seems to be a widespread inter-
est just now in the perihelion of the four
larger planets. It is claimed that this
rare occurrence—something unparalleled
during the Christian era—will so excite
the electric surface of that great and gov-
erning luminary, and all his planetary
host, as to cause visible disturbances
both in the sun and some of the planets
J. Half, writing to the Hartford *Evening
Times*, says:

Doubtless amateurs, as well as astron-
omers, will become interested in the
present planetary perihelion, which is said
by the astronomers to exceed in interest
any such conjunction within the history
of the last 2 000 years; or all four plan-
ets have their nearest approach almost
simultaneously. If it becomes an estab-
lished fact that sun spots mean tornadoes
and ruin to property and life, their first
approach upon the sun's disk will be
watched with interest. Amateurs, with
inverted telescopes properly suaded,
should examine the upper part, and with
erecting telescopes, the lower part of the
sun's disk in the morning, for the first
appearance of the spots; and as the sun
seems to make a half revolution in twelve
hours, it will be the lower side at night,
or if erect, the upper. This is contrary
to the usual method of viewing the stars
and planets, which are best seen at a
high altitude. Large spots can some-
times be seen with a smoked glass. The
extent and rapidity with which these
spots occur are an indication, according
to scientists, of their close connection
with the electro-magnetic conditions of our
own world.

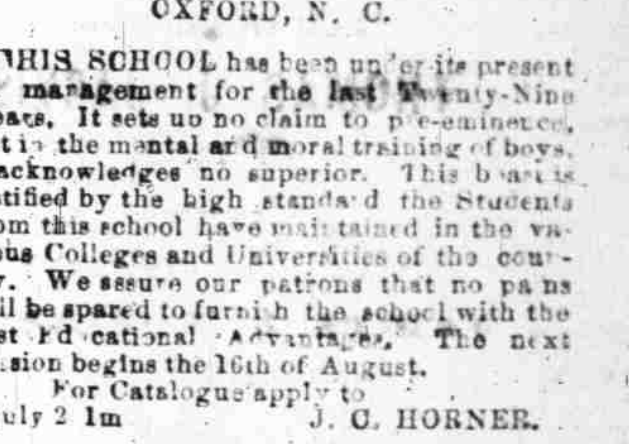
