Interesting Becision.

The State Treasurer has just rendered decision to the effect that 'if a party was United States Treasury notes, not placed in bank to his general credit, they are not taxable, but national bank notes so held are taxable, and should be listed as money on hand.' The case of the Su. preme Court of North Carolina in Ruffin vs. the Commissioners of Orange, at the June term, 1873, is cited. The Treasurer malutains that the opinion of the court, as rendered by Justice Reade, clear, ly sets forth that money, whether nas tional bank bills or United States Treasury notes, deposited in bank to the general credit of the owner, assumes the nature of a solvent credit, and must be listed as such.

Some Heavy Mementoes.

It will be remembered that some time last December a gentleman by the name of Buck, from Baltimore, who was an agent for the Bush Hill Iron Works (rolling mills), of Philadelphia, appeared here and went to Fort Caswell, where he examined the old guns at that point. Finds ing them made of such material as would work in a rolling mill he purchased 26 guns and 2 mortars from the Government. Afterwards, these 26 guns were put on a lighter, when she capsized and 19 of them were lost overboard. Recent ly 17 of these were recovered and those. together with 2 mortars, have been shipped to Philadelphia on the schooner Imagene Diverty, which cleared today for that port by Messrs. Harris & Howell. The guns were taken from Fort Caswell spiked just as they were left by the Confederates when they evacuated and blew up the fort. They are very heavy and average 6 tons of 2,240 pounds each or 13,440 pounds The sunken guns were raised by Mr. R. G. Ross, under a contract with the Bush Hill Iron Works,
