Carl Schavers, a navigator on the great deep, was charged with being drunk and disorderly. A fine of \$10 or ten days in the C. P. was the sentence of the Court, and the defendant went below. Here the docket ended and the Court adjourned.

**Sans Souci Rice.**  
We were shown to-day by J. F. Garrell, Esq., two stocks of rice raised upon his Sans Souci plantation, one of which measured 4 feet and 9 inches in length, upon which was a head of grain 10 inches long. It was pulled this morning by Mr. Garrell, who has 257 acres under cultivation in rice this year, and of which he says that the stocks shown us are a fair sample. The crop was planted on the first day of April, but it seems that there will be no April fooling about the operation this time. Mr. Garrell had 100 acres in rice last year and realized 40 bushels to the acre and this year, having had better seasons, he looks to make 50 bushels to the acre.

**Coffee in Typhoid Fever.**  
Dr. Guillaissie, of the French Navy, in a recent paper on typhoid fever says: "Coffee has given us unhopful satisfaction; after having dispensed with it we find, to our great surprise, that its action is as prompt as it is decisive. No sooner have our patients taken a few tablespoonfuls of it than their features become relaxed and they come to their senses. The next day the improvement is such that they are tempted to look upon coffee as a specific against typhoid fever. Under its influence the stupor is dispelled, and the patient rouses from the state of somnolence in which he has been since the invasion of the disease. Soon all the functions take their natural course, and he enters upon convalescence." Dr. Guillaissie gives to an adult two or three table spoonfuls of strong black coffee every two hours, alternated with one or two teaspoonfuls of claret or Burgundy wine. A little lemonade or citrate of magnesia should be taken daily, and after a while quinine. From the fact that cerebral symptoms appear first, the doctor regards typhoid fever as a nervous disease, and the coffee acting on the nerves is peculiarly indicated in the early stages before local complications arise.

The Board of County Commissioners are still in session revising the tax list.

**The Dixie Floral Fair.**

Bro. Patrick of the Wadesboro Herald, and Secretary of the Association, gives the following attractive invitation in the circular issued relative to the Floral Fair of the Dixie Agricultural and Mechanical Association, to be held in Wadesboro on the 28th and 29th inst:

You will have a chance of spending a few days in the beautiful and picturesque section around Wadesboro, N. C. High, mountainous country; pure spring water, pleasant and romantic rambles.

Persons who desire to have a nice time can come prepared to camp out. Every accommodation possible will be shown by the officers of the Association to those who desire to camp out. The Association owns forty acres of land around the fair grounds, upon which are good springs, and through which run several beautiful brooks. The weather will be mild and pleasant, and it will be much easier and a great deal pleasanter camping out than boarding and sleeping in hotels. Make up parties of four, six or a dozen; bring a cook along and have a nice time. Ample accommodations to transport baggage from the train to the camping ground will be at the depots upon the arrival of trains. Messengers are employed by the Association to render assistance to visitors. They will be at the depots on the arrival of all trains, and can be designated by a blue sash, which they will have on. Parties who would like to rent unfurnished rooms, with or without board, or persons who desire to procure lodging in advance, can do so by addressing the Secretary.

Rates of passage will be very low, so that all may have a chance of getting out of the heat and dust and spending a few days pleasantly among the mountains, hills and rocks of Anson county.

Persons desiring to go on the Excursion can get on the train at any point on the N. E. C. & D. O. R. Y., Tuesday the 27th or Wednesday the 28th of July, 1880, and return any day during the week.

Board can be obtained at from 75c to \$2 per day. There will be ample accommodation for all. Persons desiring to secure lodging in advance will address the Secretary, stating number in party, whether ladies or gents, and how many are willing to stay together in one room.

The Floral Fair of the Dixie A. and M. Association will be highly amusing and interesting, and it will amply repay any one to go two hundred miles to look from the Observatory of the main building and see the panorama that is stretched out before their gaze. The site selected for the grounds cannot be excelled in the State. From the summit of Carr's is presented one of the most beautiful picturesque views to be found in the whole Southern country. The vision at one glance sweeps the horizon for a distance of one hundred miles, and will afford a rare attraction to low country visitors.
