## The Carolina Central.

Pursuant to notice the stockholders of the Carolina Central Railroad Company met at Weldon yesterday, at 12 o'clock, to reorganize the Company. The action of the Committee of Bondholders in relation to the purchase of the road was ratified and approved, and the following officers elected:

President—D. R. Murphison.  
General Manager—Wm. McKee.  
Superintendent—V. Q. Johnson.  
Secretary and Treasurer—Jas. Anderson.

Directors—Messrs F. O. French, A. V. Stout, A. B. Graves, R. A. Lancaster, T. H. Porter and F. W. Torrey, of New York; J. S. Whedbee, of Baltimore; D. W. Oates, of Charlotte; C. S. McCall, of Bennettsville, S. C.; and George Davis and D. R. Murphison, of Wilmington.

The new officers are all excellent selections. Capt. Murphison, one of the most energetic and most successful business men in the State, who has for some time past been Receiver of the Carolina Central Railway, will bring to the difficult duties of the presidency the same remarkable care and foresight which has distinguished him in all of his business enterprises. It is a matter of peculiar gratification to us all that the presidency of the road has at length been placed in the hands of one of our own people.

Gen. William McKee's remarkable abilities as a railroad man are well known to all. It is his profession, and he has made it the business of his life, and in this instance, as in others, the place has sought the man, and not the man the place. He is a native of Wilmington and if he accepts the position which has thus been tendered him it will be a matter of peculiar gratification to our people.

Capt. V. Q. Johnson, the efficient Superintendent, is, we are pleased to see, retained in that position. He has been on the road for a long time, and has devoted himself, unreservedly, to the manifold interests of his department.

The new Secretary and Treasurer, Mr. James Anderson, is not a railroad man, but he is a gentleman of excellent business habits and with a long business experience and we have no doubt that he will give general satisfaction in the discharge of the duties of his position.

## Found Insensible.

A colored man, Peter Hanes by name, was found by Policeman Savage in an insensible condition, near the W. & W. and W. C. & A. Railroads freight depot this morning, and conveyed to the City Hall. The city physician was immediately summoned and the proper remedies applied which gradually brought the sick man to consciousness, when he was enabled to tell his name, as given above, and his occupation as that of a read hand under Captain Barry, Road Master. Doctor Walker thinks the man's sickness was caused by a stroke of apoplexy.

## And Yet Five Days.

In the midst of these fierce heats a prospect of relief is held out by Prophet Vennor, who says: "There will be some cool weather after the 20th; severe frosts in the neighborhood of the 24th, 25th and 26th, possibly with buries of snow in the mountains." Five days more of this to endure, then a week longer? Can we all stand it? Yesterday, in the middle of the day, the streets were about as completely abandoned as in the wildest of winter weather. Most people thought of nothing but how to keep cool, and of the places and the people where coolness reigns. The week will doubtless witness many departures for just such places.

## Body Recovered.

The body of little Isaac Bunting, the second son of Mr. T. O. Bunting, was recovered this morning about 10 o'clock. It was found about where it went down. From persons who were on the spot we learn that the little fellow was in the dock and walking out too far, struck the edge of the bold, precipitous bank and sank beneath the treacherous waters. He could not swim, and as he sank a cry for help was raised, but a gentleman who was on the wharf thought the children were playing, and paid no heed to their cries until it was too late. Coroner Hewlett held an inquest this forenoon, the jury returning a verdict of accidental drowning.

## Death of Mr. Bear.

Mr. Adolph Bear, a younger brother of Messrs Solomon, Samuel and Marcus Bear, of this city, and a native of Aterhausen, Bavaria, died last night on the Southern bound train when near Burgaw. Mr. Bear's disease was consumption and a fatal result has been long feared. A few weeks ago he went to Red Sulphur Springs, in Virginia, accompanied by his youngest sister, in the hope of finding relief, but was suddenly taken worse. Mr. Marcus Bear, in response to a telegram, left here to bring him home to die. His earnest wish was that his last moments might be at home, surrounded by those who loved him, but this was not to be.

Deceased was a young man only 28 years of age and unmarried, and was highly regarded by all who knew him. Our sincere sympathies are with the afflicted family.
