The Race Sailed Yesterday—The Flirt, ree Rosa, Victorious.

The challenge race between the yachts Restless and Flirt and in which the Flirt and Lizzie were permitted to participate, was sailed over the Wrightsville course on yesterday. The wind was very light from the Southeast at the start and until the race was about half finished when it died out, but in a few minutes it shifted to the Southwest and continued a lady breeze for the balance of the race. The attendance on the beach was large, there being about fifty of the fair sex and a smart sprinkling of the other kind. The yachts were started in the following order by the Judges, Messrs. Joo. J. Fowler and James A. Berry:

The race was sailed under the rules of the yacht club. The position of the yachts was changed during the first run down the channel, the Flirt and Ripple passing the other yachts, and on the second course the Lizzie passed the Restless. There were no other changes in the positions of the yachts, they coming in in the following order and time:

Flirt4h.....19m.....	40s
Ripple4h.....20m.....	20s
Lizzie4h.....22m.....	30s
Restless4h.....24m.....	86s

By a glance at the tables it will be seen that the Flirt made up forty seconds of the time given the Flirt on the start on account of length. The actual sailing time made by the yachts is as follows:

Flirt2h.....3m.....	2s
Ripple2h.....2m.....	12s
Lizzie2h.....5m.....	40s
Restless2h.....9m.....	35s

The race was a very close one as between the two leading yachts, the Flirt beating the Ripple by only 50 seconds.

The result of the race yesterday does not affect the right of the Restless to wear the champion flag of the Club, which she bore off on the fifth of July at the regular regatta. By the rules of the Club, the champion flag can only be taken at a regular race.

The next Club regatta will be sailed some time between the 1st and 10th of August, but the exact date has not yet been decided upon.

Disastrous Fire.

The fire this afternoon, the alarm for which was sounded about half past 4 o'clock, came from the residence of Mr. James C. Stevenson, corner of Fifth and Nun streets.

We can learn no particulars other than that, just as we are compelled to close at 5.15 o'clock, to go to press, the kitchen has been destroyed and the house is now on fire. The fire department is on the ground in force and every effort is being used to check the flames.

The Last Sad Rites

The remains of the late Adolph Bear were escorted to their last resting place yesterday afternoon by the family of the deceased and a long list of friends. The remains were taken from the residence of his brother, Mr. Marcus Bear on Fifth, between Market and Princess streets, direct to Oakdale Cemetery, where they were interred in the beautiful Hebrew enclosure, where already many of the Jewish faith peacefully sleep. The members of Germania Lodge No. 4, K. of P. and of Cornelius Harnett Council R. A., of both of which deceased was a member, accompanied the remains to the grave where the last sad rites were performed by them.

The funeral cortege was a very lengthy one, and was confined to no particular creed and no particular sect, thereby testifying the high esteem in which the deceased was universally held.

Picnic and Target Shooting.

Our friends of the Howard Relief Steam Fire Engine Company picniced it on Wrightsville Sound on yesterday and in the afternoon indulged in a target practice. It was first intended that the practice should be had on the mainland but owing to the fact that the bulkhead behind the target had not been finished they were compelled to cross the Sound and shoot down the beach. The distance of the range was three hundred feet and the guns used are the same as are now in the possession of the State Guard. None of the contestants in the match were permitted to practice before the shooting and taking everything into consideration the scores were very creditable.

Three prizes were offered by the company and three by individuals. The prizes, six in all, were as follows: A gold-headed cane, a silver castor, a silver butter dish, a handsome clock, a silver goblet, and a gold-lined silver cup. The man who made the best score was allowed first selection, second best second selection and so on. The following gentlemen were declared winners in the order in which they are named, they having scored the numbers opposite their names out of a possible 15:

John Geichen, 11; D. Listgen, 10; H. Rahtzen, 9; D. Dasher, 8; A. Lessman, 6; O. Machilus, 4.

Mr. Geichen, we learn, has selected the gold-headed cane and Foreman Leitgen the handsome castor. We were unable to ascertain which of the prizes the other fortunate gentlemen selected, but as they are all so handsome (the prizes, we mean) there is but little difference between them. The 'Adrian boys' will long remember the day, and some of them think that the three masted schooner out at sea, about two hundred yards to the left of the target, which ran up a white flag when our friend Henry Ohlandt fired will also remember it.

Go to Bed Early.
To all young people, to students, to the sedentary and to invalids, the folks: sleep that the system will take without artificial means is the balm of life—without it there can be no restoration to health and activity again. Never wake up the sick or infirm, or young children, of a morning—it is a barbarity; let them wake of themselves; let the care rather be to establish an hour for retiring, so early that their fullest sleep may be out before sunrise.

Another item of very great importance is: Do not hurry up the young and the weakly. It is no advantage to pull them out of bed as soon as their eyes are open, nor is it best for the studios, or even for the well who have passed an unusually fatiguing day, to jump out of bed the moment they wake up; let them remain, without going to sleep again, until the sense of weariness passes from their limbs. Nature abhors wrong things—violence and a vacuum. The sun does not break out at once into the glare of the meridian. The diurnal flowers unfold themselves by slow degrees; nor fleetest beast, nor sprightliest bird, leaps at once

from its resting-place. By all of which we mean to say, that as no physiological truth is more demonstrable than that the brain, and with it the whole nervous system, is recuperated by sleep, it is of the first importance, as to the well-being of the human system, that it have its fullest measure of it; and to that end, the habit of retiring to bed early should be made imperative on all children, and no ordinary events should be allowed to interfere with it. Its moral healthfulness is not less important than its physical. Many a young man, many a young woman, has made the first step towards degradation, and crime, and disease, after ten o'clock at night, at which hour, the year round, the old, the middle-aged, and the young, should be in bed; and then the early rising will take care of itself, with the incalculable accompaniment of a fully rested body and a renovated brain. We repeat, there is neither wisdom, nor health, in early rising in itself; but there is all of them in the persistent practice of retiring to bed at any early hour, winter and summer.
