A. & N. C. R. R. Lease.

As there is much interest felt bere in the proposed lease by the Wilmington & Weldon R. R. Company, of the Atlantic & North Carolina R. R., we copy here, from yesterday's Raleigh News, the preceedings of the committee appointed at the stockholder's meeting held last month to consider the proposition submitteds, at a meeting held by them on Wednesday

On Thurday, the 24th of June, at a meeting I the stockhold rs of the Atlantic and North Carolina Kailroad, a com mittee consisting of Messrs J L Morehead, H F Grainger, J A Bryan, Jno Hughes, E R Stanly, W B Duncan, J C Wooten, C R Thomas and F M Simiel 'the proposition to lease the road made by the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad Company and all other proposi tions; the committee were to 'consider the propositions and such others as were made or should be made by any persons. The committee met last Wednesday at Moret aed City to receive proposi-

The Wilmington & Weldon Railroad, through its president, Col R & Bridgers, submitted a proposition which we learn was in substance as follows:

1. To pay an annual rental of \$32,500 in quarterly instalments for a term of 30 years, the Atlantic & North Carolina Railroad Company to pay all taxes, and after payment of interest and expenses to apply the remainder of lease money to payment of debt. If this cannot be paid before maturity, then to a sinking fund for the debt.

2. The present line of road to be main. tained, and rolling stock, machinery and property to be returned at the expiration of the lease, in condition as good as when

possession was taken. 3. Rates for carrying cotton shall not Carolina Railroad beyond the tariff of April 1st, 1878. The gauge of the Road, motive power and rolling stock to be changed to that of the Wilmfngton & Wilmington & Welden Bailroad Com-

4 If the State of North Carolina shall regain control of the North Carolina Railroad after the termination of its lease to cock, he says, fully merits the title of 'suthe Richmond & Danville Railroad Company, and will arrange to carry into eftect what is termed the 'North Uarolina System,' the stockho'ders in general meete ing of the Atlantic & North Carolina ence is such that a look or a smile from Railroad Company shall have power to terminate this lease.

Another proposi ion was submitted from Messrs W P Clyde, A S Buford and A B Andrews, in the interest of the Kichmond & Danville Company.

As nearly as we could learn the following is a synopsis of their proposition : 1. To maintain and operate the road, to keep the road and all the property of the lessor corporation in good order during the lease, and return it in good order at the expiration of the lease.

2. To pay a rent of \$00,000 a year in semi annual instalments. The lessees to have a right to sublet to the Richmond & Danville, the North Carolina Railread Company, or to any other corporation, with the assent and approval of the lessor.

3. The lessees shall also pay to the lessor company, besides the \$30,000 a year of rent, one-half of the net earnings of the railroad and its property. These payments are to be made annually and on terms to be hereafter agreed upon. are to be ascertained by three intelligent and disinterested referees, one to be appointed by the lessor, one by the lessees.

A Test of Purity in Water.

The most rough and ready way that has been employed for ascertaining whother or not water is pol'uted with organ ic matter is to partly fill a clean bottle with a sample of it, and then having violently shaken the same, to take a hearty sniff of the air of the bottle which has been agitated with the water. If the air smells sweet and fresh the absence of an injurious amount of organic matter is i ferred, and vice versa. It is very easy thus to distinguish between river water and spring water, and a very impure water which may exhibit no fault to the eye may frequently disclose to the olfactory nerves the fact of its pollution. If no smell is observed in this manner, some may be observed on gently warming the water, and if not then, the addition of a few grains of caustic potash may render it apparent.
