## Alarm of Fire.

About 8.30 o'clock this morning the kitchen on the premises occupied by Mr. Benjamin Mott, on Fifth street, near the Methodist church, was discovered to be on fire between the ceiling and weatherboarding. The alarm was sounded, and the neighbors immediately assembled, and by tearing off a few boards succeeded in extinguishing the flames before any material damage was done. It was supposed to have been the work of an incendiary as there was some lightwood placed immediately under where the fire was located and there were indications that the fire had been dropped there through a hole made in the ceiling.

## Death of Mr. Williams.

It was with great regret that we learned on Saturday night last of the death of Mr. Thomas Williams, of Pender county. He died about 8 1/2 o'clock of that night at the Purcell House, in this city, where he had been sick for just one week. On Saturday, the 10th inst., Mr. Williams came down to the city with a Review reporter and was then complaining of feeling unwell. He has been sick ever since, but it was only on Saturday last, the day of his death, that his friends became seriously alarmed. So unconscious were they of his near end that several of them visited and conversed with him late in the afternoon of that day without the slightest premonition that in a few hours more their friend would be cold in death.  
Mr. Williams was quite a young man only 32, at the time of his death. He was the son of Capt David Williams, of Company K, Third North Carolina Infantry, a brave and chivalrous soul who yielded up his life at Sharpsburg. He was a native of Holly Shelter district, then a part of New Hanover, but now in Pender county. He was universally admired, esteemed and loved, as a genial, kind gentleman, an honest man, one whose place in life it will be hard to fill and whose death is mourned by many.

The remains were taken hence to Rocky Point yesterday morning and in the afternoon were interred. The funeral services took place at Pike Creek church, Rev. D. B. Black officiating, and were attended by a large concourse of sorrowing friends.

But we haven't discovered any one who found out positively his intentions. All we can say is, that it is our belief when General MacRae gets ready to let the people know his intentions he will do it, and until that time there isn't much use in any one trying to find out from him what his purposes are; but still we can't help wishing and hoping that it will be consistent with General MacRae's desires, as well as his interest, to come back and locate among us once again.
