**The Very First.**  
The first scuppernon grapes of the

**Joint Meeting of Commissioners and  
Magistrates.**  
The Board of Magistrates and Board  
of County Commissioners meet on Mon-  
day next in joint session for the purpose  
of making a tax levy for the ensuing  
twelve months. The Commissioners have  
agreed that 63 cents on the \$100 will be  
sufficient for the county's needs during  
the next twelve months, which it is sup-  
posed, of course, the Board of Magistrates  
will readily concur in. Of this 63 cents  
levy it is proposed by the Commissioners,  
as was stated in yesterday's REVIEW, to  
put aside 10 cents as a sinking fund to  
meet the bonded debt of the county, fall-  
ing due in 1887.

In addition to this joint meeting of the  
two Boards, the Justices of the Peace are  
called together by the Chairman of the  
Board of Magistrates for the purpose of  
electing a Board of County Com-  
missioners, to serve for the next two  
years commencing in January, 1881.  
We do not know what ticket will be pre-  
sented for election, but if the presen-  
Board of Commissioners will consent to  
accept office again, their past services  
are certainly a good recommendation for  
re-election.

The Criminal Court meets also on the  
same day as the two county boards men-  
tioned above, but we presume His Hon-  
or will adjourn his Court until 12 or 2  
o'clock of that day and allow the magis-  
trates and commissioners the use of the  
Court House until they dispose of their  
business, which we imagine will not con-  
sume more than two hours at the farthest.
