The Columbus Democrats.
The Democrats in Columbus county have determined to have a grand rally on Saturday, August 21st, at Whiteville. It will be under the auspices of the Hancock and Jarvis Club which, we are pleased to learn, is strong in numbers and flourishing in condition. Great preparations will be made and a special train from this city is talked of for the occasion.

The Duplin Canal.
A letter from Mr. W. T. Banerman, of Burgaw, to Mr. B. G. Wurth, President of the Duplin Canal Company, received to-day, contains some very encouraging information relative to the progress made in that important work. Mr. Banerman says that he saw a boat go through from the blockade on Shelter Creek to North East river. Mr. B. went from the river on a flat about 7 feet wide, half through to Shelter Creek. The water was from four to five feet deep and as far as they went in the flat the canal was about five feet wide. The sluicing process seems to be working well. There is a plenty of water now—in fact, the river is a little too high—but it is running off and as soon as it falls a few inches more the current through the canal will be much stronger and more effective. The ditch beyond the blockade in the direction of Meeks' seems to be caving and sluicing wider and deeper, which is just what was desired. Mr. Banerman adds that Maj. Young seems much encouraged and that the works begin to look like a canal.

City Court.
Quite an array of cases awaited the Mayor's consideration this morning. The first called was C. H. Grant, charged with disorderly conduct and resisting the police. \$10 fine or ten days in the City Prison was the judgment of the Court in this instance and defendant went below.

Robert Jones, a colored lad about 12 or 13 years of age, was arraigned for an assault upon Thomas McKenzie, another colored lad apparently about the same age, with a deadly weapon—a pocket knife—infllicting a wound in the left arm of the last named boy. The evidence in the case was to the effect that the wounded boy, who is in the employ of Mr. H. C. Prempert, on South Front street, told the boy not to stand in front of his "Boss's" door and crowd the sidewalk; that for this the defendant drew his knife and stabbed McKenzie in the arm. The Mayor bound defendant over in the sum of \$50 for his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court.

Jno. Burnett, Jno. H. Cowan and H. King, hucksters, were next arraigned for failing to pay license tax. Judgment was suspended upon payment of the back tax and costs.
G. Herring was the next case called. The charge in this case was selling fish and neglecting to pay tax when called upon by the Clerk of Market. Judgment similar to the preceding cases was rendered in this instance also.
G. Mitchell, colored, was arraigned for selling vegetables without a license, and judgment was suspended on payment of tax and costs.
Sam Merrick, colored, charged with selling vegetables without paying the tax and also retailing fresh meat without a license from his butcher shop, was the next case to claim the attention of the Court. The defendant was represented by counsel in the person of Jno. L. Holmes, Esq., who argued the legality of the tax with the Court, but finally submitted to a judgment of the costs in the case and the tax and license due by defendant.

The Bankers' Convention

The annual convention of the American Bankers' Association will be held at Saratoga, N. Y., commencing August 11th, and continuing three days. Every banking firm, national bank, State bank, trust company and savings bank in the United States is entitled to one delegate, and it is expected the attendance this year will be unusually large. Secretary Sherman has promised to address the convention upon resumption and refunding. Among the special topics announced are the silver question, the banking and industrial development of the last year, with its causes and prospective results, the prevention of panics, the mischiefs of ill directed taxation, the clearing house systems at home and abroad, and the financial conditions which promote banking stability, commercial progress and industrial prosperity.
So far as is known now there will be no one in attendance this year from this city. Mr. James Dawson has been in the habit of attending but he is in Europe now.
