 From Capt. Joseph Price, Harbor Master, we have the following report of the number of arrivals at the port of Wilmington for the month of July, 1880:

Early Cotton.
 Our venerable friend, Mr. E. Lilly, of this city, who is on a scout up the C. C. Railroad, sends us by mail from Laurinburg five bolls of open cotton, the first we have seen this season, taken from the plantation of Mr. G. A. Roper, near that place. Mr. Lilly writes that Mr. Roper has two hundred acres of the same product under cultivation all of which promises a large yield. The cotton crop in that particular section, our correspondent further adds, is perfectly magnificent. Mr. Roper, we learn from the same source, expects to have a new bale in market by the 12th inst. Who can beat it?

Joint Meeting.
 The joint meeting of the Board of County Commissioners and Board of Magistrates met in the Court House this morning in compliance with law, Jac. S. James, Esq., in the chair. Justice Jno. Cowan, Secretary of the Board of Magistrates, called the roll and found a quorum present.
 The minutes of the last joint meeting were read and approved.
 Chairman Smith, of the County Commissioners, stated that the Commissioners had reduced the tax last year on general expenses from 42 cents on the \$100, to 34 cents, making a deduction of 8 cents on the \$100. He then read an estimate prepared by the County Commissioners for the expenses of the County for the ensuing year, viz: On real estate, personal property, salaries and incomes; General expenses, 30 cents on each \$100; Criminal Court, 18 cents on each \$100 sinking fund and interest 15 cents; total 63. On polls, general expenses, 90 cents; Criminal Court 54 cents, sinking fund and interest 45 cents; total, \$1.89.
 The estimates were concurred in and ratified by the meeting upon motion of Justice T. M. Gardner.
 Justice E. D. Hall offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:
Resolved, That the Board of County Commissioners for the last twelve months, for faithful performance of their duty and keeping the credit of the county without reproach and the sinking of the county debt are entitled to the thanks of every citizen in the county and we, the Magistrates now assembled, do hereby tender to them the same.
 The meeting then adjourned.

Board of Magistrates.
 Immediately after the adjournment of the Joint Meeting of the Board of Magistrates and the Board of County Commissioners, the first named body met in accordance to law, Justice Jno. S. James presiding.
 The election of a Board of County Commissioners for the ensuing year was held and the following gentlemen were declared elected: Col. W. L. Smith, Messrs. H. A. Bagg, B. G. Worth, J. A. Montgomery, and E. S. Pierce. The new Board will enter upon the discharge of their duties on the 1st Monday of December. Chairman Jno. S. James tendered his resignation as Chairman of the Board of Magistrates, but, by unanimous request, withdrew it. The meeting then adjourned.

Criminal Court.
 This Court, His Honor, Judge Meares, presiding and Mr. Solicitor Moore present, convened this afternoon, the court room having been occupied by the Board of Magistrates this morning. The following are the names of those composing the Grand Jury, viz: R. W. Chadwick, Foreman; Jno. A. Farrow, T. H. McKoy, C. W. Stokely, Geo. A. Peck, Ephram Bishop, D. N. Yates, Geo. Honnet, R. E. Lee, H. Middleton, W. H. W. F. Dell, Jos. B. Worth, Jesse Ives, Geo. F. Tilley, Benj. Farrow, A. A. Hartsfield, Jno. M. Robinson and Owen Fennell, Jr.
 The balance of the afternoon was taken up in swearing witnesses to go before the Grand Jury.

City Court.
 Four arrests were made on Saturday night by Officers Ned Griffith and Nelson in the neighborhood of Melinda Blake's alley, as it is called, on Fourth street. The parties arrested were white and colored, and in some instances a mixture of both. Jno. W. Leonard, a white man, Mary Dyer, a black woman, Laney Quinn, a white woman, and Harriet Stuart, a mulatto, were the persons arraigned. Judgment was suspended in all the cases except that of Laney Quinn, and she was ordered to pay a fine of \$5, in default of which she went below.
 Carrie Hill, a white woman, at whose house, it is alleged, the above disturbance was created, was arraigned for keeping a disorderly house. The testimony of one witness was taken when the case was continued until to-morrow morning to allow defendant to summon witnesses. The defendant was then recognized in the sum of \$20 for her appearance at the Mayor's Court to-morrow morning at 9 1/2 o'clock. This exhausted the docket and the Court adjourned.

County Commissioners.
 The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session this afternoon at 3 1/2 o'clock, present, Chairman W. L. Smith and Commissioners Worth, Bagg, Montgomery and Grady.
 The Treasurer submitted his report for the month of July showing a balance of \$14,002.27 on hand of the general fund due the same and \$3,248.24 of the educational fund; special fund due him \$515.83. He surrendered twelve coupons of \$3 each.

 FAISON, N. C., July 31st, 1880.
 This thriving, beautiful village, in the garden spot of Eastern North Carolina, was alive with good people of Democratic faith and sympathy, who were called together to listen to the Democratic truths enunciated by the standard-bearer in this Congressional district, Mr. John W.
