**Two Capital Cases.**  
Stephen Richardson, colored, charged with the murder of his mother in law, was arraigned before the Criminal Court this morning and his trial set for 9 o'clock Friday morning, 6th inst. A special venire of 100 men has been ordered. Messrs J. D. Bellamy, Jr., E. S. Martin and W. B. McKay have been assigned as counsel for the defense.  
Virgil Hill, charged with burglary, was also arraigned to-day. A special venire of 50 men has been ordered. Capt W S Norment and Mr F H Darby have been assigned as his counsel. The trial is set for Saturday morning, the 7th inst, at 9 o'clock.

**Criminal Court.**  
This Court met this morning and has disposed of the following cases to-day:  
State vs. M. A. Dozier, perjury. Not guilty.  
State vs. Merrick & Page, fornication and adultery. *Sci fa*.  
State vs. A. C. Penton, false pretenses. Not guilty.  
State vs. Chas. Wessell, *sci fa*. Dismissed.  
State vs. Merrick, et al *sci fa*. Judgment nisi.  
State vs. J. A. Jones, forcible trespass. Judgment suspended upon payment of cost.  
State vs. Joanna Robinson, *sci fa*. Dismissed.  
Several other *sci fa*'s were dismissed.

**City Court.**  
Stephen Hill, colored, charged with disorderly conduct and resisting police, was fined \$5 or given the alternative of ten days in the C. P. The prisoner went below.  
Joseph Wadell, colored, for following a policeman and making remarks about the arrest of the officer had made, was in consideration of his being the first offence fined only \$10; in default of payment, however, the defendant was ordered to be imprisoned for fifteen days.  
Carrie Hill, a low white woman, whose trial was continued on account of the absence of witnesses yesterday, was again brought to the bar of the Court to-day, upon the charge of keeping a disorderly house. The testimony of defendant's own witnesses were overwhelmingly against her and defendant was ordered to pay a fine of \$25 or enjoy the solitude of a cell for thirty days; not being flushed she took the alternative and slowly and sadly bent her steps towards the Guard Room. This case finished, the Court adjourned.

**Arrested for an Affay.**  
Sarah Davis and Minnie Loftin two colored women, got into an animated dispute at the corner of Fourth and Brunswick streets about 11 o'clock this morning, and Sarah Davis made a forcible demonstration of the strength of her side of the question by two cuts with a knife, one in the neck and the other on the arm of Minnie Loftin, while the last named party sought to rebut this kind of argument with a stone which she deposited temporarily on the head and directly behind the ear of her opponent in a very forcible manner, indeed, so much so that it made a peculiar impression and left an abrasion of the cuticle but didn't penetrate the cranium. While the discussion was at this heat Officer Bryant, of the police force, came along and acted as umpire in the matter in a very summary manner and escorted them both to the Guard House. Sarah Davis resisted all the way and caused a great deal of trouble. Mayor Fishplate will interview the damsel in the morning.

**Triennial Convocation.**  
The Grand Commandery of Knights Templar held their Triennial Convocation in the city of Chicago, commencing Saturday, the 17th inst. Messrs. H H Munson and W H Coadbourn, of this city, are expected to be in attendance. The General Grand Chapter meets in Detroit on the 24th inst.

**Democratic Rally.**  
We understand that there is to be a grand Hancock and Jarvis meeting at Freeman's X Roads, in Columbus county, a few miles from Brinkley's, on next Saturday week. Eminent speakers will be invited and it is expected that some of the Democrats in Wilmington will go up to assist on the interesting occasion.

**Pender County.**  
At the meeting of the Board of Magistrates in Pender county, held yesterday at Burgaw, Messrs Daniel Shaw, Jas H Alderman and G W Corbett were elected a Board of County Commissioners for the ensuing year. This is the old Board, and their reelection is a graceful acknowledgment of the faithful and untiring zeal with which they have administered the affairs of the county during the past two years. Like our own Board, they have succeeded in making numerous reductions in the expenses of the county and in largely reducing the debt, some particulars in reference to which will be found in the interesting orrulence published on the fourth page of this issue.

**Bishop Atkinson's Health.**  
By a private letter from Col. Atkinson to a gentleman in this city, we learn that Bishop Atkinson's condition, though not alarming as to any immediate danger, is still such that his physician gives no hope of the Bishop's ultimate recovery; in fact the day of his death is only postponed for a short, a very short period, as the family have been told that he may survive the summer. The inflammation in his lungs still continues and he is constantly expectorating blood therefrom. This is sad news we know to many of our readers, for the old Bishop is much venerated and beloved by all classes in this community as well as in other parts of the State.

**Board of Magistrates of Brunswick County.**  
Met in the Court House at Smithville yesterday, in pursuance with the law. Justice T. M. Williams presiding. The majority of the Magistrates of the county were present.  
Upon motion Mr. A. W. Redger was elected Chairman for the next two years and Mr. Jno. H. Mints Secretary.  
The question of reducing the number of Commissioners from 5 to 3 was discussed and the reduction was made. An election was held for County Commissioners with the following result:  
Messrs. T. M. Williams, (one of the old Board) of Smithville, P Prieoleau, of Smithville, and Jno. H. Mints, of Shallotte.  
Registrars and poll-holders were appointed for the coming election.  
The meeting then adjourned.

**JOINT MEETING.**  
The Board of County Commissioners and Board of Magistrates met in joint session immediately after the adjournment of the last named body. A tax levy of 6 1/2 cents on the \$100, for State and County purposes, and \$2 on poll for State and County, was concurred in by joint ballot.  
The Commissioners estimate that the County can be run on \$2,500 during the next year. The County is now out of debt and is in a flourishing and prosperous condition.
