Board of Aldermen.
The Board of Aldermen met in regular monthly session at the City Hall yesterday afternoon.
The Ordinance Committee reported favorably on the petition of Dr. Norcom, and the report was received and adopted.
The Committee on Public Buildings, on the matter of repairs for Little's Giant Engine Company, were granted further time.
The Mayor announced Alderman Divine as a committee man on all committees where vacancies existed.
The Mayor presented the contract and bond of the Wilmington Market Company, and desired to know if the bond was satisfactory to the Board, and if the contract had been carried out.
Alderman Divine offered the following, which was adopted:
WHEREAS, The 'Wilmington Market Company' have tendered certain markets to this Board as the markets provided for by the contract of the said market company with the city of Wilmington; and whereas, they claim that they have fulfilled the other provisions of the said contract; and whereas, the Board of Aldermen are not fully satisfied that all the provisions of the said contract are complied with; therefore, be it
Resolved, That the consideration of the performance of the said contract on the part of the 'Wilmington Market Company' be postponed to the next regular meeting of this Board, and in the meantime the said markets be examined by a committee of this Board, and the City Attorney be required to examine into all the legal questions involved in the said contract, and report to this Board.

On Motion.
On motion, the Mayor appointed the following aldermen as a committee to act with himself in accordance with the above resolution, viz: Aldermen Bowden, Divine, Hill and King.
Alderman Foster offered the following resolution which was adopted:
Resolved, That his Honor, S. H. Fish, be appointed a committee of two on the part of the Board of Aldermen, and request that the Board of Audit and Finance, Board of Underwriters, Board of Trade, and the Chamber of Commerce appoint a like committee to confer with Mr. A. Wilkins, who proposes to construct in our city a complete system of water works—works known as the Holly system. Said committees are requested to report to this Board at the next meeting.
Alderman Foster offered the following resolution which was adopted:
Resolved, That the ordinance in regard to collecting taxes, on Page 199, Minutes of the Board of Aldermen, be strictly enforced.
The report of the Chief of the Fire Department for the month of July was received and ordered on file.
The Board then adjourned.

The Point Caswell Meeting.
We trust that there will be fair weather for the grand rally which is to be had at Point Caswell on Friday. The good folks up there are making extensive preparations for a big turnout, and we trust that they will not be disappointed. The steamer *John Dawson* will, we understand, leave here to-morrow and return on Friday after the speaking, and thus accommodate those who wish to go up from the city.
Criminal Court.
The attention of the Court to-day was consumed in disposing of several of the following cases:
State vs. O. H. Grant, assault and battery. Guilty. Judgment, fine of six-pence and cost, of Court.
State vs. Amos Boston, assault and battery. Discharged at defendant's cost.
State vs. Sam Smith, nuisance. Guilty. Sentence of Court six months in work-house.
The greater portion of the morning session was consumed in hearing the above cases.

Democracy at Duplin.
There was a large gathering at Kenansville, Duplin County, yesterday, the 3d inst., to listen to the speeches of Governor Jarvis and Attorney General Kenan, in behalf of Democracy, and ex-Judge Buxton and R. M. Norment, on the Radical side. It was estimated that there were at least 1,500 persons present, a large majority of whom were, of course, Democrats.
Gov. Jarvis opened the ball in an able, exhaustive and convincing argument in favor of Democratic principles. He was followed by Judge Buxton, who attacked the Governor's record relative to the secrecy with which the sale of the Western North Carolina Railroad was effected. To this the Governor replied in such a way as to completely annihilate every position taken by the Judge.
Dr. R. M. Norment, the Republican candidate for Secretary of State, followed in a short speech, which had no other effect than to disgust his hearers and to secure for himself a scathing, withering rebuke from Attorney-General Kenan, who made the closing speech of the day. The effort of the Colonel was truly grand and won for him a host of friends. There is no lukewarmness in good old Democratic Duplin and at the November election she will poll a larger vote and a larger majority than ever.

Messrs. Herring & Moore, at Burgaw, are doing a big root and herb business. As an instance of the amount they are actually doing, we will state that on last Saturday, the 31st ult., they bought \$100 worth of herbs.
The Cape Fear is very low. The steamer *D. Murchison*, from Fayetteville, did not arrive here until 9 o'clock this morning. The rains we had here met her at a point about fifty miles above the city.
The thermometer in this office registered 83 degrees at 3 o'clock to-day. At 10 o'clock it stood at 86.
There is some hope that it will clear up to-morrow; the almanac promises rain for to-day.
The sun will set to-morrow evening at exactly 7 o'clock.
