Water Works.
The committees on the part of the city government, Board of Audit, Produce Exchange, Chamber of Commerce and Board of Trade will meet at the City Hall on Monday next to consider the proposition of Mr. A. Wilkins to construct in this city a complete system of water works known as the "Holly System". Mr. Wilkins proposes to expend about \$200,000 in Wilmington in the construction of these works. We trust that Mr. Wilkins' proposition will meet with favor and that at an early date Wilmington will be supplied with hydrants, etc.

Struck by Lightning.
On Wednesday night, about 2 o'clock, during the prevalence of the thunderstorm, the house of Mr. Frank Kennedy, on Masonboro Sound, was struck by lightning, but we are glad to learn that no one was very seriously hurt. A tree standing in the yard was struck, and a dairy under it and near the house was shattered, the dishes, milk, &c., being scattered all around. It is thought that the lightning passed from the dairy through an open window into the house.

If the license tax can be reduced from the present exorbitant figures, Mr. Haight will bill this city for two days, viz: September 9th and about January 12th, on return trip. If the license tax cannot be reduced the great circus will be run right through and we will not be allowed even to smell the sawdust or see the animals.

A Democratic Convention Called in Pender.

At a meeting of the Pender County Democratic Executive Committee, held at Burgaw, last Monday, it was decided to call a Convention to nominate candidates for county offices, on the 16th of September. Township meetings to elect delegates to the Convention were ordered to be held on the 11th day of September.

The committee, we understand, passed a unanimous resolution binding themselves individually and collectively not to accept from the convention any candidacy for any office whatever. Another resolution was also passed denouncing all independent's and bolters.

The Committee after resolving to carry out implicitly the orders of the State Executive Committee as recently published, adjourned to await the action of the County Convention which assembled at Burgaw as above stated on the 16th day of September next.
