The Murder Case.
The trial of Stephen Richardson
charged with the murder of his mother-
in-law, which was set for today has
been continued until Tuesday, because
of the absence of material witnesses for
the defence. The defendant's counsel moved
to continue the case for the term. The
motion was not granted and the case was
peremptorily set for Tuesday. The pris-
oner, who is a mulatto man of about 40
years of age was brought into the Court
Room handcuffed. He seemed some-
what nervous and his eyes wandered
rapidly to different portions of the room,
but invariably fell when he detected any
one watching him. After the continu-
ance of the case the prisoner was carried
back handcuffed to jail followed by a
large crowd.
Old man Phinney, his father-in-law, who
it is alleged, was also murderously es-
saulted by Richardson, and who is the
principal witness for the prosecution, was
carried to the Court House in a convey-
ance, and had to receive assistance in as-
cending the stairs to the Court Room. He
was then permitted to lie down on a
lounge in the Commissioners Room ad-
joining the Court House. His grey head
was bandaged up in clean white muslin
and his left hand is still in a sling.
The scars on his right hand show con-
clusively that he received some heavy
blows. Much interest is manifested in
the case. Richardson's wife will not be
permitted to testify in the case as the law
does not admit of the evidence of wife for
or against her husband.
