**An Enormous Freshet.**  
 By advices received here to-day it is known that there is a tremendous freshet in the Cape Fear river. The water had risen 32 feet up to this afternoon and at the rate of two feet an hour. Capt. Garrison, of the steamer *D. Murchison*, reports that the magnificent crops of corn on the river lowlands will all be lost as the water was over the top of the corn yesterday. At least one hundred thousand bushels of corn are now under water and will prove an entire loss.

**How to be Weather Wise.**  
 As everybody is interested in the weather, so each one should qualify himself or herself to read the sky, and to interpret the meaning of the winds, sky and clouds. The following directions, therefore, given by a distinguished weather prophet, may be of interest and use to those who aspire to such wisdom:

An intensely blue and serene sky indicates heavy rains and severe storms in from twelve to forty-eight hours. A gray, hazy sky indicates continuous dry and generally hot weather.

A southeast wind indicates the existence of a low barometer, if not a storm center in the northwest. The aspect of the sky and clouds will tell whether it means mischief or not. An almost immediate cessation of rain may be expected as soon as the northwest winds set in. It matters not when the west wind sets in; fair weather will ensue, and continue from three to four days.

**Flag Raising at Point Caswell.**  
 Notwithstanding the very disagreeable weather there was a fine attendance at the flag raising yesterday at Point Caswell under the auspices of the Hancock and Jarvis Club at that place. But for the rain there would most likely have been thousands on the ground instead of hundreds. The pole is a very handsome one, and the arrangements had been made so carefully that it was soon in the ground when a beautiful large banner, bearing the inscription 'Hancock and English, Jarvis and Robinson, J. W. Shackelford,' was flung to the breeze. As it gracefully ascended to the masthead Capt. R. P. Paddison called for three cheers for the ticket and they were given with a lusty good-will. Mr. John D. Kerr, of Sampson, was then called upon to address the assemblage which he did in his usual handsome and graceful manner but unfortunately the rain, which had suspended operations during the raising of the pole and the floating of the flag, began to fall again and Mr. Kerr was compelled to close. There was no other speaking, per stress of weather.

**Criminal Court.**  
 Virgil Hill, colored, was put on trial to-day on the charge of having burglarized Mr. John Neimeyer's residence on the height of the 16th of last June. The evidence in the case was entirely circumstantial, although some of it was considered very strong. In view of the fact, though, that there was no positive proof in the evidence, Mr. Solicitor Moore concluded not to send the case to the jury but with the consent of His Honor the case was with drawn and the prisoner was discharged. The entire forenoon was occupied in hearing the testimony.

The Court was adjourned to meet again at 4 o'clock, for the transaction of some routine business. It will meet again on Monday morning and then adjourn over until Tuesday, on which day Stephen Richardson is to be placed on trial for murder.

Virgil Hill was defended by Capt. W. S. Norment and Mr. F. H. Darby, who were assigned to this duty by the Court.

**August.**  
 The just opened month, August, derived from the Roman calendar, was originally called Sextilis, or the sixth month of the year, which, with the Romans, began in March. Julius Caesar made it thirty days long, and his nephew, Augustus, added another day to it. As it was the month in which Augustus had entered upon his first Consulship; had celebrated three triumphs in the city; had received the allegiance of the soldiers who occupied the Janiculum; had conquered Egypt, and ended the civil war, the Senate, desirous to compliment him, changed the name of the month to August just as Quintillus had been changed to July out of honor to the great Julius, who had been kind enough to be born on the 12th of last month. The Flemings and Germans have adopted the word August as another name for harvest. Thus *oogst maand* is harvest month; the Teuton *August wagon* is harvest wagon, and the Dutch *oogsten* means to gather corn from the field. The Spaniards use the verb *agostar* and *hacer su agosto*

to signify gathering harvest, and the French have the phrase *faire l'Autot* for same thing. The Anglo Saxons named August the weed month, and the old Germans called it *weintoch*, the wine press month. August is represented in myth by a naked man, with disheveled, flying hair, holding to his mouth with both hands a drinking horn, and at his side are a bundle of peacock's feathers, some melons, and a second drinking horn.
