This was the eighel for readiness and two steambouts in the river below blew their whisties. The man paused for a out a munte longer and tuen sprang from the bridge. Both feet were held tightly together and his figure was erect. His hands and arms were flapped, as a bird's wings are. In this manner he continued until within about fifteen of the surface of the Was ter, when he drew his arms to his side and threw his head forward. He struck the water on the middle of his back.

There was a moment of suspense, in which the spectators held their breaths, and every eye peared. In less than a minute he came to the surfice struck out for the nearest craft. He was taken to the shore, and friends curried him to the hotel, where a phy sician rubbed him down with alcohol and rolled him in blackets. His pulce was found to be at 130, and ten minutes later it was reduced to 105
