How to Pack Cotton.

The New York cotton exchange, the law on such matters, has adopted the following: The usual side pieces not to be considered unnecessary bagging. 6 o'clock sharp, in order that clerks and Side pieces should each consist of no more than a single half width bagging running the whole length of the bale, nor shall the full widths of bagging be considered necessary, provided they only run the length of the bale, the heads being protected by head pieces of a single thickness of cloth; but three full widths of bagging lapping each other at the beads, shall subject the bale to deduction of two pounds. Unnecessary bagging shall be understood to mean all bagging not absolutely essential to cover and protect the contents of the bale in a proper
