An Iron Bridge for Smith's Creek. We understand that the Wilmington and Weldon R. R. Co. having completed the beautiful new iron bridge over the tracks at Front street depot, have concluded to build an iron bridge over Smith's Creek, one mile from the depot, to take the place of the wooden structure there now. The work is to begin in a few days.
