The Railroad Combination.

The combination entered into by the Richmond and Danville corporation and the Atlantic Coast Line seems to be exciting a good deal of interest about Augusta and other southern points. The *Augusta Evening News* says:
 "These two great rival lines will now be controlled by the same officers, and run schedules to equalize the vast business from and to the North in the passenger and freight departments."
 "This is one of the largest and most powerful railroad combinations of the day, and controls all the land avenues from the North through this section. What portions of the road will be made trunk lines or the regular through line is not known, but for the Florida travel both routes through Augusta and the Coast Line through Charleston and Savannah will be principally used."
 We understand from a pretty reliable source that the change in the management of the freight and passenger department of this new combination goes into effect about the 10th or 15th of this month, whereby Col. A. Pope, who has been the General Freight and Passenger Agent of the Atlantic Coast Line, assumes entire control of the passenger department of the Richmond and Danville Railroad as well as the passenger business of the Coast Line, at the same time relinquishing the freight department of the Atlantic Coast Line to Mr. So. Haas, General Freight Agent of the Richmond and Danville R. R. This will give both of these gentlemen greater territory in their particular department than they have ever enjoyed before. Col. Pope, by his excellent business qualities, untiring energy and indefatigable and persistent labor has developed an immense business, both in freight and passenger traffic, on the Coast Line, hitherto unknown to this route, and he is regarded as one of the most competent and capable officers, in his particular department, to be found anywhere from Maine to Texas.

Mr. Haas, the successor of Col. Pope, is well known to our citizens by a residence of several years in Wilmington shortly after the war when at one time he did the largest wholesale and commission business that was done by any one firm, perhaps, in this city or in any other city in the State. Of Mr. Haas' business qualities therefore it is useless for us to speak, except to remark that after an experience of only about ten years in the railroad business his promotion has been unprecedented. That he is a gentleman of excellent parts, quick perception and thorough business capacity, his advancement to the very responsible position which he has been called to occupy by the large capitalists and business men who form the syndicate of the new combination is the best evidence in the world.
