The Democrats of Columbus.

The Democrats of Columbus county assembled in Convention at Whiteville, the County Seat, on Saturday last for the purpose of making nominations for the county officers and to select a Representative for the lower house of the Legislature. Mr. D. P. High, Chairman of the County Executive Committee, called the meeting to order by proposing Col. H. B. Short, of Waccamaw township, to act as temporary Chairman. Upon assuming the Chair, Col. Short made a few appropriate remarks, stating the object of the meeting and counseling harmony and good feeling. The meeting was then further organized by requesting Messrs E. D. Meares and G. B. Robinson to act as Secretaries.

Col. Short was then, upon motion, made permanent Chairman of the meeting and the Convention proceeded to business.

Col. T. F. Toon, of the gallant old 20th N. C. Regiment, was chosen as the nominee for the House of Representatives and in answer to loud calls made a telling speech in which he gracefully acknowledged the compliment and accepted the nomination.

Sheriff Arch. McCallum was renominated for the same office.

For County Treasurer, Captain M. A. Byrne, the present incumbent, received the nomination.

Rev. J. W. Dickson was nominated for Register of Deeds and J. W. Thompson, Esq., was made the choice of the Convention for County Surveyor, and Thompson was nominated for the office of Coroner.

Everything was harmonious and pleasant, so our informant adds, and business was dispatched with ease and rapidity.

Before the adjournment of the Convention, Col. Short, the Chairman, made an eloquent speech in which he predicted success for our cause in November next, provided, we worked in perfect harmony, frown down everything like independence and put our shoulder to the wheel and work with energy and determination until the 1st day of the departing sun has disappeared below the horizon on the 21 day of November, 1880.

The time consumed in transacting the business of the meeting and listening to the speeches did not exceed two hours, when the Convention adjourned *sine die*.

The Railroad Combination.

The Review has been the first and thus far, we believe, the only paper in North Carolina to publish, authoritatively, any information relative to the important change in the freight and passenger management of the R. & D. R. R. and the Atlantic Coast Line. We stated on Saturday that the combination had positively been agreed upon and would certainly go into effect on the 15th inst. The following, which we find in the *Baltimore Sun*, of Friday's date, will confirm all we have stated relative to the matter within the past week:

Railroad matters of interest which have been under discussion for some time by the presidents of Southern lines resulted Wednesday in an agreement on the part of the roads by which freight rates are to be equalized, and by which there is to be no more cutting of rates. The agreement was consummated at the meeting held at the Carrollton Hotel, in Baltimore, at which the following gentlemen were present: Col. John M. Robinson, president of the Seaboard Air-Line, comprising the Bay Line, Seaboard and Roanoke Railroad, Raleigh and Gaston Railroad and Raleigh and Augusta Railroad; Mr. A. S. Buford, president of the Piedmont Air Line, composed of the Richmond and Danville Railroad, North Carolina Railroad, and Charlotte, Columbia and Augusta; Messrs. B. F. Newcomer and William T. Walters, representing the Atlantic Coast Line, which comprises the Richmond and Petersburg Railroad, Wilmington and Weldon Railroad, and Wilmington, Columbia and Augusta Railroad, and others. The combination of interests is to go into effect on September 15. Mr. Sol. Haas has been made general freight agent of all the lines, with a salary of \$5,000 per annum, and is to supervise freight matters generally and to see that none of the roads cut rates. Mr. A. Pope will be general passenger agent. All points in controversy will be settled by a commission of one from each line. It is stated that there is no intention to either advance or diminish freight charges at this time; but only to come to an agreement which will prevent the necessity of the roads 'cutting each other's throats,' and to at the same time reduce expenses. Col. Robinson went to New York after the meeting.

Murderous Family.

One of his brothers has already suffered the death penalty and during the trial of Peter another brother slew his victim. The second brother escaped but Peter is now in jail so weak that he cannot stand up and will be hung lying down.

Drowned White in a Fit.

Yesterday afternoon, about 3 o'clock, a colored man who, up to two weeks ago, was in the employ of Mr. George Jernigan at H'ron Bridge, was taken with a fit, while in a fit near H'ron, and while under the influence of the proxymans rolled overboard and before assistance could reach him was drowned. We have been unable to learn the name of the unfortunate man, Mr. Jernigan himself informing us that he only knew him as Henry. The deceased had recently been engaged in the flating or lightering business and had made one trip up the North East river. At last accounts the body had not been recovered.

County Commissioners.

The Board met in adjourned session this afternoon. Present: Col. Smith, the Chairman, and Commissioners Worth, Grady and Montgomery.

The tax books prepared and computed by Col. Jas. G. Burr were delivered to the Board, examined and found correct and ordered delivered to the Sheriff for collection, the bond given by that official in December last being satisfactory to the Board and he having settled with the State and County for the year 1879.

In the First Ward, Upper Division, Charles W. Stewart was appointed Registrar, vice Charles Murphy, and Charles Murphy was appointed a Judge of Election, vice Charles W. Stewart.

In the Fifth Ward James B. Dudley was appointed a Judge of Election, vice Henry Green, excused.

The Treasurer presented his annual statement, which was approved by the Finance Committee.

Adjourned to the first Monday in October, at 2 1/2 P. M.

On the adjournment of the Board of Commissioners, the Board of Education was called to order.

Census reports were received from districts 1, 2, 3, 4 and 6 and financial reports were received only from the 2d district.

By order of the Board, Chestnut street was made the dividing line of the two districts for the colored schools.

The census for the distribution of the school fund for the ensuing year is as follows:

No. 1—White, 9806; colored, 1,550.

No. 2—White, 916; colored, 1,466.

No. 3—White, 74; colored, 91.

No. 4—White, 121; colored, 97.

No. 5—White, 89; colored, 446.

The Board then proceeded to the nomination of County Examiner for the ensuing year. Messrs. A. J. Grady and R. W. Chadwick were put in nomination and Mr. Chadwick was elected.
