**A Cute Thing.**

The cutest thing that we have heard of  
 during the campaign was in a bet made  
 here yesterday between two prominent  
 lawyers in this city. One of these, a gen-

## Day of Atonement.

The feast observed by our Jewish citi-  
 zens as 'Yom Kippur,' or Day of Atonement,  
 falls due to-morrow, the 15th inst.  
 It is their great fast day, for twenty-four  
 hours. The fast is complete, not even  
 water being allowed. It begins at sunset  
 this afternoon, and with solemn cere-  
 monials. The belief is that Kosh Hashanah  
 closes the year's record, and thence to  
 Yom Kippur angels scan and dispute the  
 record, but on that day the status of every  
 Hebrew is fixed for the new year. From  
 the services of that day every Jew is be-  
 lieved to go forth with a conscience pure  
 toward God, having forgiven all enemies  
 and sought also God's forgiveness for all  
 transgressions. In a newness of spirit,  
 reconciled to both God and his fellowmen,  
 he closes the solemnity of Yom Kippur,  
 which begins with a religious service. The  
 observance of the day is derived from the  
 commandment of the Lord in the 23d  
 chapter of Leviticus. It will be strictly  
 observed in this city by those of the Jewish  
 faith. All business will be suspended  
 from sunset this afternoon until sunset to-  
 morrow afternoon. Services will be held  
 to-morrow in the Temple, which will be  
 open throughout the day, beginning at 10  
 o'clock.
