MAINE.

The latest news received here to-day, up to this hour, is but confirmatory of the special dispatches published by us yesterday, so far as the defeat of the Republicans is concerned. There seems to be no doubt of the election of Plaised but his actual majority is not yet ascertained. The latest information will be found on the first page of this issue, in special dispatches received after this side of the paper had been put to press.

A GERMAN BOOM FOR HAWKINS.

The New York papers state that the German mass meeting at Cooper Institute Friday evening was the largest of the campaign in that city, with the exception of the great mass meeting of July 28 at the Academy of Music. Hon. Augustus Belmont presided in the Institute, and there were large overflow meetings outside. The speakers included many prominent Germans who have heretofore acted with the Republican party.

THE SOLID SOUTH.

The South, says the Buffalo Courier, constitutes the leading or sole issue of Republicans in Northern political contests. The white people of the South are denounced as rascals and "bandits" though the latter term is no longer used — by almost every Republican stump speaker. They are abused and made odious as if they were public enemies, if not enemies of the human race. An electoral contest is represented virtually as a

war of the North against the South. Having done all this the Republicans affect surprise or indignation at the "solidity" of the South. If they should win by these methods the South is likely to become more "solid" than ever and the same contest will have to be fought over four years hence. Fortunately, the signs of the times point to a different result, namely, the defeat of sectionalism by the defeat of the Republican party.

THE COTTON MARKET.

The New York Cotton prints the following review of the cotton market during the past week:

The New York market for contracts has continued unsettled and irregular. The unfavorable weather at the South, coupled with rumors in regard to a bull movement by prominent speculators, led to an advance early in the week, to which Liverpool finally responded; but yesterday futures here declined, on the very heavy receipts at the ports.

September closes at 11.10c, to 11.20c, against 11.00c, a week ago; October, 10.78 against 10.50c, to 10.54c; November, 10.65 to 10.66 against 10.42 to 10.43; December, 10.66 to 10.67, against 10.43 to 10.44; January, 10.76 to 10.77, against 10.53 to 10.54; February, 10.89 to 10.90, against 10.66 to 10.68; March, 11.03 to 11.04, against 10.79 to 10.81; April, 11.17 to 11.18, against 10.43 to 10.45. The official close was "weak."

Spot cotton is in fair demand. Thursday quotations were revised, the low grades being marked up and the highest grades reduced. Yesterday's quotations were 19 5-16c for good ordinary; 11 3-16c for low middling, and 11 11-16c for middling. The committee reported that "the better grades of new cotton are offered to arrive at lower rates." The Southern markets were strong yesterday, New Orleans advancing 1/2 to 1 1/2, and Savannah, 1/2 to 10 1/2. The new cotton is moving out from the ports very rapidly.

Futures were higher early in the day at Liverpool, but closed lower and flat. Spots were firm, and another 1-16c higher, at 7 1/2. Manchester was cabled firm but not much doing, with the same figures as a week ago. The takings by the trade for the week were 47,930 bales. Stock, 597,000 bales, against 341,000. All but 119,000 bales, against 118,000.

The following table shows the receipts at the various ports, for the week, with comparisons:

OUR PLATFORM.

The following is the Platform of the Democratic party adopted at the National Convention held recently at Cincinnati:

1st. We pledge ourselves anew to the constitutional doctrines and traditions of the Democratic party, as illustrated by the teaching and example of the long line of Democratic statesmen and patriots, and embodied in the platform of the last National Convention of the party.

2d. Opposition to centralization and to that dangerous spirit of encroachment which tends to the consolidated powers of all the departments in one, and thus to create, whatever be the form of government, a real despotism; no sumptuary laws; separation of church and State for the good of each; common schools fostered and protected.

3d. Home rule, honest money, a strict maintenance of public faith; a currency consisting of gold and silver, and paper convertible into coin; on demand; strict

maintenance of public faith, State and National, and a tariff for revenue only.

4th. The subordination of the military to the civil powers, and a general and thorough reform of the civil service.

5th. The right to a free ballot is a right preservative of all rights, and must and shall be maintained in every part of the United States.

6th. The existing administration is the representative of conspiracy only, and its claim of right to surround the ballot boxes with troops and deputy marshals, to intimidate and obstruct electors, and the unprecedented use of the veto to maintain its corrupt and despotic power, insults the people and imperils their institutions.

7th. The great fraud of 1876-77, by which, upon a false count of the electoral vote of two States, the candidate defeated at the polls was declared to be the President, and for the first time in American history the will of the people was set aside, under a threat of military violence, struck a deadly blow at our system of representative government. The Democratic party, to preserve the country from civil war, submitted for the time, in the firm and patriotic faith that the people would punish this crime in 1880. This issue precedes and dwarfs every other. It imposes a more sacred duty upon the people of the Union than was ever addressed to the conscience of a nation of freemen.

8th. We execrate the course of this administration in making places in the civil service a reward for political crime, and demand a reform by a statute which shall make it forever impossible for a defeated candidate to bribe his way to the seat of the usurper, by billeting villains upon the people.

9th. The resolution of Samuel J. Tilden not again to be a candidate for the exalted place to which he was elected by a majority of his countrymen, and from which he was excluded by the leaders of the Republican party, is received by the Democrats of the United States with sensibility, and they declare their confidence in his wisdom, patriotism and integrity, unshaken by the assaults of a common enemy, and they further assure him that he is followed into the retirement he has chosen for himself by the sympathy and respect of his fellow citizens, who regard him as one who by the elevating standard of public morality and adorning and purifying public service, merits the lasting gratitude of his country and his party.

10th. Free ships and a living chance for American commerce on the seas and on the land. No discrimination in favor of transportation laws, corporations or monopolies.

11th. An amendment of the Burlingame treaty. No more Chinese immigration except for travel, education and foreign commerce, and therein carefully guarded.

12th. Public money and public credit for public purposes solely, and the public land for actual settlers.

13th. The Democratic party is the friend of labor and the laboring man, and pledges itself to protect him alike against cormorants and the commune.

14th. We congratulate the country upon the honesty and thrift of the Democratic Congress, which has reduced the public expenditure forty millions a year; upon the continuation of prosperity at home, and the national honor abroad, and above all, upon the promise of such a change in the administration of the government as shall insure us a genuine and lasting reform in every department of the public service.

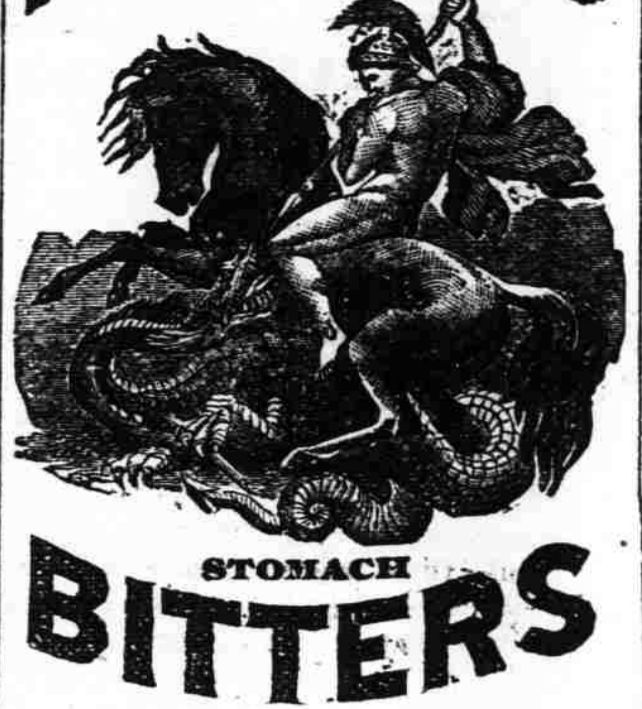
