Chloride of Lime as a Disinfectant.
One pound requires three gallons of water, use the clear solution. To purify rooms, sprinkle on the floor, and, if needful, on the bed linen. Infected clothes should be dipped in it, just before they are washed. It purifies night commodes, water closets, &c. It may also be used in its pure state. For butcher stalls, fish markets, slaughter houses, sinks, and wherever there are offensive putrid gases, sprinkle it about, and in a few days the smell will pass away. If a rat or mouse should die about the house, and send forth an offensive gas, place some chloride of lime in an open vessel near the place where the nuisance is, and it will soon purify the atmosphere. Chloride of lime in a room will cause iron or steel to rust rapidly.
The Yacht Race—The slowest on Record—Where was the Qui Vive?
The regular September race of the Carolina Yacht Club was drifted over the Wrightsville course on yesterday. The yachts *Restless*, *Firt*, *Lizzie* and *Ripple* entered for the race, but as there was no wind the yachts drifted through the course and the *Qui Vive* would have stood a good showing for the champion flag. There was no wind at all, only a squit or two from the East, and the *Ripple* came in about half a mile ahead of the others.
The *Ripple* made the course in 2 hours 48 minutes and 45 seconds. The rules of the Club say that the race shall be made in 2 hours and 30 minutes. There was some misinterpretation of the rules by the Regatta Committee and Commodore Wiggins refused to give up the champion flag. To-day, we believe the committee agreed to give it to the *Ripple*, though it is thought that the race is an "off race," and no one is entitled to it. The race of yesterday is the slowest race on record, and if the *Ripple* gets the flag it will be by the skin of her teeth.

The R. R. News in Charlotte.
The recent Railroad Combination in this State is attracting very general attention in this and adjoining States, below we give an extract from the Charlotte *Observer* of yesterday's date, which is as follows:
There is no longer any doubt that Mr. J. M. Robinson, president of the Seaboard & Roanoke, Raleigh & Gaston and Raleigh & Augusta Air-Line Railroads has entered with all his roads into the combination first formed between the Richmond & Danville Railroad and the Atlantic Coast Line. It was at first thought that he was only into it to the extent of the Seaboard Railroad, from Portsmouth to Weldon which is part of the Coast Line, but it has since been learned that both his other roads are included. This looks like there is not to be much competition for freight in this section of the country for the present at least. Mr Sol Haas has charge of the freight department of the whole concern.
