Chloride of Lime as a Disinfectant One pound requires three gallons of water, use the clear solution. To purify rooms, sprinkle on the floor, and, if needful, on the bed linen. Infected clothes should be dipped in it, just before they are washed. It purifies night commodes, water closets, &c. It may also be used in its pure state. For butcher stalls, fish markets, slaughter houses, sinks, and wherever there are offensive putrid gases, sprinkle it about, and in a few days the smell will pass away. If a rat or mouse should die about the house, and send forth an offensive gas, place some chloride of lime in an open vessel near the place were the nuisance is, and it will soon purify the atmosphere, Chloride of lime in a room will cause iron or steel to rust rapidly.
