Aid for the King's Mountain Centennial.
Col. C. R. Jones, editor of the Charlotte Observer, is in this city soliciting subscriptions to the King's Mountain Centennial fund. As one of the Centennial Executive Committee Col. Jones stated at an informal meeting of the members of the Produce Exchange and Chamber of Commerce, held at the rooms of the Exchange this morning, that relying upon the patriotism of North Carolina everywhere throughout the State to assist them in their undertaking, the Committee had ordered a monument to commemorate the battle and the Centennial celebration at a cost of \$2,500. It was to help defray this expense that he now appealed to the patriotism of the citizens of Wilmington, to come to their assistance. Col. Roger Moore, Vice-President of the Exchange, who presided at the meeting, at the request of Col. Jones appointed a committee of gentlemen from the Exchange, consisting of Col. F. W. Kerchner, and Messrs B. F. Mitchell and Donald MacRae, to accompany Col. Jones and introduce him to the business men of the community. The committee, we understand, meet at 5 o'clock this afternoon when they will make the Grand Rounds.

At 8 o'clock to-day the thermometer in this office registered 88 degrees.

Pender County Republican Convention.

There was a large Republican mass meeting held at Rocky Point on Saturday last. The occasion was a county convention to nominate the county candidates and a candidate for the Senatorial district of Pender and New Hanover. There were present quite a number of Republican speakers from Pender, New Hanover, Brunswick and other counties, and especially was there a very large turnout of the colored and white Radicals of Pender. They came pouring into Rocky Point early on Friday, continued to come in increasing numbers all that night, and next day until 12 o'clock.

We publish the following statement of the proceedings. After much electioneering and great wrangling the following nominations were made:

For the Legislature—William E. Cowan.
For Sheriff—Eli R. Williams.
For Register of Deeds—A. E. Taylor.
For Coroner—J. H. Brown.
For Surveyor—C. M. Taylor.

It is true that all these nominees are white men; and that they all reside at Burgaw, except the candidate for Surveyor, and yet of the eleven hundred and over of Republican voters in Pender, all are colored, except about thirty or forty whites.

Thus is there a repetition in Pender of the shameful truth that when nominations are to be made or offices filled the colored men are elbowed aside or thrown overboard and white Radicals alone are chosen.

There were a large number of colored Republicans in Pender who electioneered hard for these nominations and who were promised them by white Republicans and treacherous men of their own race, and yet by a system of deception and cheating practiced upon them, white Republicans, who are really unpopular with the party, and obnoxious to the people have gobbled up the nominations, and the poor, ignorant and deluded colored candidates are now commanded to hold their tongues and keep the peace; and they will obey the order. Only one thing was done to soothe the appetite of the colored men for office, Augustus Gamberg, who has so long lorded it over the race in Pender, and who was by far more rigid and tyrannical over them than was ever any Southern slaveholder over his slaves, was displaced from the chairmanship of the County Executive Committee, and Archy Walker, a colored man, but a much smarter and more liberal man, was elected in his place.

Gamberg remonstrated and was furious, but it was of no use; he was decapitated. H. E. Scott was nominated for Senator. Public speaking was the order of the day, after the noisy wrangles of the convention were over. Ex-Judge Watts, Republican Elector, was the most efficient and impressive speaker. He is a much abler man and a much better speaker than Buxton or any of the Radical nominees for the State offices.

Of the candidates, W. E. Cowan, the nominee for the Legislature, is undoubtedly the ablest man of the party in Pender county. He has been for some years past of the firm of Tienken & Cowan, whose house and store building at Burgaw were recently destroyed by fire. His partner, Mr. Tienken, is a good Democrat. Eli R. Williams, the candidate for Sheriff, is a recent convert. Two years ago he was a greenbacker. He wanted an "office" then but didn't get one; it is only very recently that he has stuck his head into the blacking pot. He is at present, and has been for years past, a clerk at the Carolina Central Freight Depot in this city, but has somehow managed to find time to canvass for office. Isaac H. Brown is at present the Republican Register of Deeds in Pender county. Not being able to secure the nomination for Register again he went in for Coroner. Of the rest we know simply nothing. They are alike to fortune and to fame unknown, and bid fair to remain right there for a long time to come. We don't believe any one of the newly nominated county officers will, if elected, be able to file a bond, and it will therefore be folly to vote for them.

A Reckless Runaway Hoax—Narrow Escape.

This morning about 9 o'clock, or shortly thereafter, as Mr. David B. Mitchell was driving in his buggy down Front street the horse suddenly took flight when opposite Mr. D. A. Smith's furniture store and dashed off at a break neck speed. Mr. Mitchell gathered his loose reins in as soon as possible and commenced sawing on the bit but failing to check the speed of the animal by this means he wheeled the frightened horse by a sudden jerk from Front street into Princess but unfortunately, or perhaps fortunately, the horse in turning ran into one of the iron telegraph poles at the corner of Front and Princess, capsizing and breaking the buggy and throwing Mr. Mitchell against the iron pole which by a lucky presence of mind he grasped hold of, thereby saving himself from being thrown to the stone pavement. The horse was then seized by some person near at hand and thus checked in his mad career. We are happy to state that neither Mr. Mitchell nor his horse sustained any injury; the buggy is probably damaged to the extent of \$20 or \$30. It was truly a narrow escape.

City Court.

The market question came up before the Mayor pro temp. this morning, in which J. R. Melton was charged with selling and retailing meat in an unlicensed and prohibited place, to wit—the Old Market House. DuBrutz Cutlar, Esq., acting City Attorney, was present, and upon the charge being read by the Clerk of the Court against defendant, arose and stated that the question at issue between the city on the one side and the New Market Company on the other was undergoing legal investigation, and was in abeyance at present, but the question at issue between the city and the Market Company was not involved in this case at all; it was simply a violation of a city ordinance by defendant, and inasmuch as defendant had come into court, willing to submit the case and had submitted the matter, and thereby purged himself in a manner of the contempt shown the city authorities, he would suggest to His Honor that he dismiss the case upon payment of costs. The Mayor pro temp. then stated that while his position in regard to the New Market business was well known, he would unhesitatingly, as an officer of the law, have imposed a fine or other punishment, as his judgment might direct, regardless of friend or foe, but for the advice and suggestion of the city's legal adviser, and acting under this instruction, he would dismiss defendant upon payment of costs.

David Mallett, drunk and down on Saturday night, was taken to the Guard House and held till this morning, when he was discharged.
