Analyses made at the Experiment Station of Waters from Wilmington, for the North Carolina Board of Health.

Table with columns for Locality, Total Solids, and Free Ammonia. Lists water samples from various locations like Spring corner, Well Orange, etc.

The following notes will serve to give an interpretation of the analyses reported above. Free ammonia not over 0.1 parts per million is of little moment.

'Chlorine alone without albuminoid or free ammonia is not suspicious even when present to the extent of 8 to 10 grains per gallon.

'Albuminoid ammonia over 0.10 parts per million is always suspicious, whether alone or accompanied by free ammonia.

'Any waters containing the following combinations are very bad: Albuminoid ammonia over 0.10 parts per million, chlorine over 6 grains per gallon.

It will be seen by this standard that specimen No. 2 is bad, No. 6 is also bad, although lacking the requisite amount of chlorine. The specimens from Smith's Creek, taken at two stations, are suspicious, and this is worth careful investigation in view of this stream being possibly selected for our future water supply.

An analysis made of the water of Greenfield Mill Pond several years ago gave total solids at 2.68. Prof. Kerr remarked at the time of publishing the above report, that "Greenfield Pond water shows a very remarkable degree of purity surpassing even Croton."

Other analyses of Smith's Creek water are in progress. September 21st, 1880. T. F. W. The Postal Service for a Year. From the annual report of Chief Inspector Parker, of the operations of post-office department inspectors, or special agents, as formerly known, for the last fiscal year, it appears that 577 persons were arrested for violation of postal laws. Of this number 215 were convicted, 18 acquitted, 2 escaped, 3 forfeited bail, 34 proceedings were dismissed, and in 226 cases trails are not yet reached; 31 highwaymen were convicted of robbing the mails on the frontier and 39 burglars were arrested for breaking into postoffices. The Inspectors reported upon 22,511 cases of various kinds which were referred to them for investigation, including charges against employees of the department, complaints against contractors, bonds of postmasters, examination of accounts of postoffices, complaints of lost letters, etc.
