Within the past few days I have been in portions of the counties of Johnston, Wayne, Lanoir, Craven, Carteres, Sampson, Duplin, Proder, New Hanover and Bladen, and never t this teason have I se n so much cotton open The fields are perfectly white, and in consequence of this rapid opening, and in such quar tities, the labor at hand a insufficient to pick it out. A heavy storm or rainfall would cause large quantities to fall ou .
It is unusual for the top crop to open b . fore about the last of October or first of November, but in many instances the top crop (which is universally and unfortunately ver; small) is nearly entirely open. Old farmers say it is a bad sign for a cotton crop to open early, and ins deed it now looks like there is a good deal in the saying for the crop will surely be very greatly cut off, and as far as my observation has gone, I think I can sole y say not much more than half a crop wil be made. I saw a good deal of the effects of rust, but not as much as I had anticipated, but for some cause there seems to be a manifest falling off in the fruit and of the cotton crop.
