### Death of Mr. Isaac Wells.

We only a few days ago chronicled the death of an old citizen and now we are called upon to announce the death of another. In this instance it is not a native of the place but one who has been identified so long with Wilmington and her interests and resided within her limits so long that he might be almost said to have grown up with the place. Mr. Isaac Wells, whose death we are called upon to announce, departed this life in this city this morning, about 6 o'clock. The deceased had been unwell for several days and his sickness finally culminated in a congestive chill which caused his death. Mr. Wells was about seventy or seventy-one years of age. He came to this city when quite a boy from Connecticut, and was an apprentice to Mr. Erastus Buck, a carriage builder, in or about the year 1824 or 1825, the establishment at the time being located about where Hart, Bailey & Co's foundry now stands. After he grew to manhood Mr. Wells amassed considerable property which, however, owing to the result of the war made him poor again. His last enterprise was a tannery which he in connection with others had started in the South end of the city on Third street near the "old gallows hill" as it is called. The deceased leaves no family and no relatives in this city. The funeral took place this afternoon at 4 o'clock. The remains were interred in Bellevue Cemetery.

### Dog Tongue.

Vanilla, or dog tongue, having become a commodity in our market, a few words touching its preparation would not be misplaced. In the first place the largest and brightest leaves, well dried, bring the highest prices. To attain the best prices the following directions will be of service: Pull the best whole leaves, spread them out in the sun, taking good care that they are not piled on each other, but have every leaf free to the sun. Take care that no dew or other dampness falls on them until the stalk or main vein is well dry, as any dampness causes heat and mould after they have been packed. Curing leaves this way will cause them to be bright after being cured, and to command the highest prices. The leaves of the vanilla, or dog tongue, cured in this way bring from 2 to 3 cents per pound, while dark leaves bring but 1 1/2 to 2 cents.
