**In Bad Luck.**  
It seems that the circus people are having rather a streak of ill-fortune lately. Only a few days since the death of James Robinson, the fearless bare-back rider, was announced, and almost simultaneously John King, the keeper of the elephants in the same circus, was killed by one of the infuriated beasts, and now we learn from the Columbus (Ga.) Enquirer that on the 28th ult., at Opelika, Ala., Mr. Melville, the famous rider of Coup's circus, the same who performed here a few weeks since, in one of his most difficult feats missed the horse's back, and fell to the ground, his head striking first. He was carried from the ring in an unconscious state and the general opinion was that he would not live.

**The State Fair.**  
The State Fair at Raleigh opens two weeks from to-day. Capt. Denson, the Secretary, writes us as follows: It is gratifying to be able to report to you that our prospects for a Fair valuable to the substantial interests of North Carolina and successful in every point of view, never were so bright as at present.

With abundant crops and increased prosperity, and in good spirits the people manifest by their prompt entries and a large correspondence, that our next Fair will surpass any thing in the history of the society. The display of fine stock and the variety of machinery will be unusually fine. The Trades Procession will be a great feature on Wednesday and the trials of speed throughout the week on an extreme scale.

**Eating Lemons.**  
A good deal has been said through the papers lately about the healthfulness of lemons. The latest advice as to how to use them so they will do the most good runs as follows: "Most people know the benefit of lemonade before breakfast but few know how it is more than doubled by taking another at night also. The way to get the better of a bilious system without blue pills or quinine, is to take the juice of one, two or three lemons, as the appetite craves, in as much ice water as makes it pleasant to drink, without sugar, before going to bed. In the morning on rising, or at least half an hour before breakfast, take the one lemon in a goblet of water. **A Banner at Carver's Creek.**  
Our good friends at Carver's Creek had a very pleasant affair last Saturday, the occasion being the raising of a flag pole by the Democratic Club at that place. Col. L. L. Polk entertained the people very handsomely in an admirable speech. There were many ladies present and not the most insignificant feature of the day was a basket picnic prepared and arranged under their supervision. A hard-some flag was raised on the pole which had been previously prepared by the Club. The weather was pleasant, the crowd was large, the table was well spread and everybody was in an enjoyable humor.

**The Peanut Crop.**  
The peanut year closes, as the cotton year does, on the 31st day of August. The receipts this year, at this port, were 135,000 bushels, as compared with 15,000 bushels for the previous year, a gain of 30,000 bushels. Petersburg claims 400,000 bushels, and Norfolk 800,000 bushels, during the past year. As the Virginia crop is about 1,300,000 or 1,400,000 bushels, Norfolk and Petersburg seem to have taken nearly all of it, although it is probable that some of their receipts were from North Carolina.

**Criminal Court.**  
The October term of this Court, His Honor Judge Meares presiding, convened at the Court House this morning. The following named persons were drawn as Grand Jurors for the term, to-wit: W. I. Gore, foreman, F. A. Newbury, Jno. D. Nixon, E. W. Rue, C. C. Ketchum, Preston Spriggs, W. H. Clarke, J. W. Taylor, Edward Howard, W. A. Springer, Joseph McLaurin, W. R. Taliaferro, G. N. Moore, Duncan Bryan, C. M. Harris, Wm. Kellogg, Rich P. Hall, Isham Quick. The jury having been duly sworn and assigned to the jury box, His Honor proceeded to deliver his charge, which was delivered in his usual plain and forcible manner. His Honor, in view of the near approach of the election in November, referred to the election laws and the penalty of a violation of the same, either by disturbance at the polls or intimidation of any kind, and asserted most emphatically that he would administer the law without regard to the individual and enforce the full penalty in every case, where the proof was sufficient to convict, that came before him, for trial. At the conclusion of the charge, the Grand Jury retired and the Court took a recess until half-past 2 o'clock. In the afternoon session the most of the time was consumed in calling over the docket and arranging the Calendar for the week.

**County Commissioners.**  
The Board met this afternoon in regular monthly session. The Treasurer reported as follows: General fund, balance on hand, \$10,642.49. Educational fund, balance on hand, \$6,425.78. Special fund, showing balance due Treasurer, \$1,526.74. Coupons, 39 in number, of \$15 dollars each, and 57 of \$3 each, were surrendered and destroyed in the presence of the Board. The Register submitted his report of fees received for marriage license for the month of September, exhibiting a receipt from the County Treasurer for the sum of \$18.05 paid in. Joshua D. Jones was ordered relieved from the payment of poll tax because of physical disability. W. C. Fergus was relieved of the payment of taxes in Wilmington township, he having listed in Masonboro. The estate of Joseph Farrow was relieved of the payment of decedent's poll tax, charged against the estate for the year 1880. R. S. Radcliffe was relieved of the payment of the poll tax of Alfred Brewer, he having been listed by a clerical error. W. Tienken, J. W. Duls, A. B. Cook, Jno. D. Dosher and A. D. Wessell were granted license to retail spirituous liquors. Adjourned.

On the adjournment of the Board of County Commissioners the Board of Education met but the session was a short one, the only item of business being authority given to the Trustees of District No. 1 to expend a sum, not exceeding \$950, on improving the school property on Fourth street, used for white children.
