The Triennial General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States convened in New York yesterday morning. The attendance is very large, every diocese in the United States, except North Carolina, being represented in the House of Bishops.

General Isaac F. Quinby, a classmate of Grant at West Point, General under him in the war, United States Marshal of the Northern District of New York during his Administration, Professor of Mathematics and Natural Philosophy in Rochester University, and long a leader of the Republican party in Western New York, has declared for Hancock.

A telegram from Darlington, S. C., to the New York Sun says: As was indicated in these despatches yesterday, the Attorney-General has been unable to secure the necessary testimony to proceed with the Cash-Shannon duelling cases, and announced to the court this morning that no bills against any of the parties concerned would be given to the Grand Jury at the present term. The court room was crowded.

F. P. Dewees, of Pennsylvania, has followed Dyer D. Lum's example. He preceded Congressman Murch as Chairman of the Greenback-Labor National Committee, and was the Greenback candidate in Pennsylvania for Judge of the Supreme Court. He accepted the candidacy, he says, because he thought the party ought to keep up its organization. But now he publishes a letter denouncing Weaver and the alliance he has entered into with the Garfield crowd.

The week that brings the Presidential campaign in the month of October closes solemnly, reverentially, evangelically, with a call of prayer issued by the pastors of the evangelical churches of the District of Columbia. From the national capital, which is by some regarded as good missionary ground, comes the appeal to "Christians of all denominations to unite in prayer that 'the people may withstand the temptation of wrongdoing on the day of election,' and that the candidates who will be most true to the genius of our institutions, to the best interests of the nation and our common humanity and helpful to the cause of temperance, purity and true religion may be elected."

We don't wish to make light of holy things but can't help remarking that this is all a one-sided arrangement. The prayers will be for Hancock and not for Garfield.

The New York World, in its yesterday's issue, publishes a special from Chicago which says:
General Grant to-day most emphatically denied and repudiated the alleged interview printed in a Cincinnati Republican paper, in which he was made to denounce General Hancock as a scheming politician and a vain and incompetent soldier. He says he never made any such statements to Rev. C. H. Fowler or any other person and is at a loss to know how they could have originated.

This is, of course, a most emphatic denial. But, did Gen. Grant make it? Grant seems to have been interviewed on Tuesday by a reporter for the Chicago Inter-Ocean, a widely Radical paper, and according to the Associated Press telegrams, published this morning, he acknowledged that Dr. Fowler's report was "in most respects correct." It seems to have been pretty generally understood everywhere yesterday that Grant did say what was ascribed to him. The usually very correct World has evidently got it wrong this time.

Advance in Native Products.
One year ago, on the 7th day of October, spirits turpentine sold for 27 1/2 cents; to-day the same article sold for 39 cents per gallon. Strained and good strained rosin sold on the 7th of October, 1879, at 95 cents per bbl. for strained and \$1 per bbl. for good strained, and to-day the official quotations on the boards at the Produce Exchange quote strained at \$1.20 per bbl. bid and \$1.25 asked; good strained \$1.25 per bbl. bid and \$1.30 asked. Cotton sold then at 9 1/2 cents for middling, to-day it sold at 10 1/2 cents for middling. Surely there ought to be no need for a Greenback party when greenbacks must of necessity be circulating pretty freely to establish such good prices for home productions; money must be easier or such prices would not be paid. Business must be improved and the prosperity of the country more hopeful or there would not be such a demand for these articles. If the anticipation of the election of Hancock and a return to honest and constitutional government causes such prosperous times what will be done when Hancock is elected?
