The Story of how a Brocklyn Orphan Girl is to Receive it from an 1x-Confederate.

The following letter, published yesterday, found a quick response in Brooklyn among the members of the Veteran Corps of the Thirteenth Regiment:

TG THE EDITOR OF THE HERALD-Sir: At the battle of the Mine, at Petersburg, 1864, I was Captain of Company 1, Seventcenth Regiment, South Carolina Volunteers, and in this desperate hand-to-hand fight, a Capt. Sims of a New York regiment (1 think from Brooklyn), as he mounted the breastworks immediately in front of my company was killed by Sergeant La Mott. Capt. Sims' sword has ever since been in my possession, and 1 have frequently

hoisted on the steeple. The popular enthusiasm is remarkable.

The Emperor William, in his address thanked all the German Governments for their cooperation toward the completion of the cathedral, and concluded as follows: "May this splendid 'monument remain, by the grace of God, as a promise of peace in all lands."




