THE COLORED GREENBACKERS DRIFTING.

And the rumor comes now that the colored Greenbacker is drifting back into the Republican fold, ready to march under orders from the Commissioner-in-Chief on election day and vote for J-Ames Garfield, the \$329 candidate, and Chester A. Arthur, the corrupt collector of customs in New York, whom the fraud Hayes and the bold conspirator and robber, Eliza Pinkston Sherman,

kicked out of the New York Custom House, for bribery and corruption. What then does the Greenbacker, who was formerly allied with the Democratic party, now propose to do? or what does he hope to make if he continues in his opposition to this great conservative and constitutional party? Certainly he does not think or hope even to elect any of his candidates; if must be as plain to him as the sunshine at noon on a clear summer day, that a vote now against the Democratic party is a vote in aid of the Republicans.

HINTS TO WORKINGMEN

In these days, when you appeal to a man's pocket you appeal to his reason. We trust that there are but few white men in this section who propose to vote for Garfield in preference to Hancock, but if any such there be, we commend to their careful consideration the following hints:

Chinese immigration into this country was promoted by the Burlingame treaty, conceived and perfected by a Republican administration in 1868.

Immediately after the ratification of that treaty the entire labor system of California was revolutionized by a system of peonage organized by the Six Companies of California, with a view of speculating in the cheap labor of Chinese immigrants.

In 1879 a Democratic Congress passed a bill to restrict this immigration. General Garfield, then in the House of Representatives, voted against the bill.

Rutherford B. Hayes vetoed that bill. General Garfield voted to sustain the veto, and the bill failed to receive the constitutional two-thirds vote by the Republican opposition.

Owing to this unrestricted right of immigration the labor system of the Eastern States is threatened as was that of California.

The establishment of Chinese laundries in the city of New York (where they are to be found on every second or third block), has proved such a paying speculation to the company of capitalists by which they were started, that other companies are now organizing for the establishment of Chinese barber shops; small tailor stores, shoe and cobbler's stalls on street corners, cigar shops, and other enterprises of a like character.

These capitalists have come to the conclusion, based on the profits realized from the Chinese laundry business, that there are millions of dollars to be derived from this new field of enterprise. We may, therefore, expect to see Chinese labor introduced into the New England manufactures, and Chinese stores spread all over the city of New York, from which it is the intention to extend them to Philadelphia, Boston, Baltimore, Cincinnati, Chicago, Paterson, Bridgeport and other large cities.

A move has already been made in this direction. A large Chinese tea store is now under full headway at 593 Third Avenue, near 39th street, in New York City, under the management of a Chinaman named Kwong Yet Long. The Chinese are an enterprising race, noted for their shrewdness in trade, quickness at a bargain, and ability to hold their own against the sharpest business people in the world, and great hopes are entertained from these enterprises.

The interests of miners are also menaced. Already in many Colorado mines, Chinese labor has supplanted that of American workingmen, and the same result is imminent in the mines of the East.

This is directly traceable to the unrestricted Chinese immigration brought about by Republican legislation, and for which General Garfield is greatly responsible.

Will the workingmen of American encourage this movement and promote their own ruin by voting for Garfield?

THE LAST WEEK.

There is but one week left now of the canvass, and really much remains to be accomplished. In the first place, every man's duty should begin with himself, and at his own home. Let him see, not only that his own name is properly registered but that every inmate of the same house, who may be entitled to a vote, is also properly recorded on the books. Then let him do the same for his neighbor, to the right and to the left of him, and if he finds that there is anything wrong let him individually endeavor to have it rectified. This is a small matter as regards the time necessary but it may prove an important one as regards the result. There is yet left an entire week in which to do this much for the party of peace and prosperity, of reconciliation and reform.

The ticket presented, National, State and County, from the nomination for President down to that of township constable, is in every respect an excellent one. There is not a name there but is that of an honest man and a true patriot. The contrast between that and the names presented by our opponents is so great that it is strange that any sane man can hesitate between the two. Hancock, the soldier and the statesman, is opposed by Garfield, the bribe-taker and perjurer; English, the successful man of business, by Arthur, the kicked-out corrupt Custom House official; Jarvis, the true North Carolinian, the upright man and just, by Buxton, the corrupt judge, of exhausted judiciary remedy; Shackelford, the farmer, the man of the people, without a stain on his escutcheon, by Canada, the head-centre of the Custom House ring here and the candidate of a Civil Rights Post,

It will serve to show the great difference between the two tickets—a difference as great as that between fire and water, earth and air, virtue and venality and integrity and corruption. How can any man, with the two tickets before him from which to choose, throw aside that which is the embodiment of a purity of elections, a guarantee of a simple republican form of government and the exponent of a party which looks not to the spoils of office for its reward but to the peace and prosperity and reconciliation, one with the others, of every section of our common country, and take up and vote for that which, if successful, will but surely point to treasonable designs upon the government—a ticket headed by two men who have neither of them the respect of their foes nor the confidence of their friends?
