ENTERED AT THE POSTOFFICE AT WILMINGTON, N. C., AS SECOND-CLASS MATTER.

The London Telegraph says that, in consequence of the advance in value of many securities held by the Glasgow Bank, the liquidation is likely to show much better results than were at one time anticipated, and those shareholders who have met their calls in full will be handsomely remunerated.

Mr. James G. Fair, of Nevada, and the probable Democratic Senator from that State, is of Irish birth, and is 49 years old. A motor yacht without steam now makes her way about Boston harbor. It illustrates the working of a compressed air petroleum engine. The whole engine and running machinery are contained in a long, low box in the bottom of the boat, occupying scarcely more room than would be required for the ballast of a sail-boat of its size. The peculiarity of this engine is that a common match brings it instantly into full working power.

COTTON.

The New Orleans Picayune shows that over one million bales of cotton were marketed during the month of October. The receipts at all ports were 960,000, and if the overland movement be no greater than for the same month last year, something like \$50,000,000 worth of the staple left plantations during the second month of the season. These figures are far in excess of any previous record. When the movement to the ports last October reached 884,000 bales, the figures were in excess of the prior season by nearly 200,000 bales, and now these are again overtopped by 70,000. The South Atlantic ports lead in the gain, Charleston, Savannah and Norfolk having already counted nearly 200,000 bales more than last year. At the Gulf ports only 521,000 bales have come in, compared with 528,000 in 1879.

The Picayune adds that the trade are still divided on the crop question, and the estimates vary materially, though the tendency lately has been towards higher figures. The Atlantic States seem to have fared very well in gathering the crop, and the yield will probably show an excess over last season.

There is much talk now of contesting the vote of New York State on account of the glaring frauds practiced there. It would seem that a great many of the tickets voted in that State were contrary to the law, inasmuch as they were printed on the back with the word "electors" which it is thought was done with the view of allowing the employers and manufacturers who might be at the polls an opportunity for seeing how their employees voted; a species of bulldozing worthy of the Republican party. The appeal will be, we presume, to Congress as there is but one Democrat, Horatio Seymour, Jr., on the State Board of Canvassers.

While we honestly believe that there have been great frauds practiced in New York by the Republicans, as elsewhere, and that more than enough of them can be found and identified to revolutionize the result in that State, still, we do not think that any practical result will ensue. We are of those who believe that the best time in the world to contest an election is during the canvass and at the polls and not after the returns have been received and announced. If the Democrats of New York had done their duty, as we all so fondly believed they were doing, they need not have waited until the robbery was accomplished before making their arrangements to capture the villains, but would have detected and arrested them in the very act. We shall notice with interest, however, the contest which may ensue between the rich and arrogant regues and those whom they have defrauded, but with little hopes of a successful issue for the dilatory Democracy.

As for the people of the South, they enter no protest and take no part in this fight, the Associated Press to the contrary, notwithstanding. We have done our duty and secured ourselves. Our own affairs are in the hands of honest

men, and they will remain so. What we will do four years hence—and it is a long way ahead to look—will depend upon many contingencies yet to arise.
