In the North of England there is often to be met with in the bed-rooms of hotels, and sometimes in those of private houses, the most cheap and convenient of these small and useful baths. To stand in such a bath as this, and from the water of the wash-hand basin to sponge the body rapidly over, and afterwards to dry quickly and thoroughly, is everything that is wanted if the process be carried out daily. 
