bales for the corresponding week of last
year. To date, this year, the receipts
have been 59,005 bales, against 45,130
bales to same date last year, showing
the handsome increase in favor of this
year of 13,875 bales.
In the City.
The annual meetings of the Wilming-
ton & Weldon and Wilmington, Colum-
bia & Augusta Railroads will be held in
this city to-morrow. Messrs B. F.
Newcomer, Vice-President of the two
roads, and H. B. Plant, President of the
Southern Security Company and a
stockholder in the above roads, are here
for attendance at the meetings. Mr.
Sol. Haas, General Freight Agent of the
Piedmont Air-Line, is also in the city
and will remain until after the meetings.
Found on the Street.
Notice was given last night about 9
o'clock at the Guard Room that there
was a man down on the street exposed to
the storm, near the corner of Fourth
and Queen streets. Upon receiving the
information Captain Goodman and Of-
ficer Edward Griffith, of the police force,
started out at once in search and after
perambulating the streets for some time
at last found an old colored man by the
name of Jack Sweat lying in the street
near the Gas House. A hand cart was
procured and the infirm old creature lifted
into it by these two officers and then
conveyed to the Guard House where he
now is awaiting transportation to the
County Poor House.

THE STORM.
**Forecast by the Signal Service—
Wind, Rain, Snow and Sleet.**
The storm which raged here from Sat-
urday night until to-day at noon, was
duly chronicled by the Signal Office
some twelve or fifteen hours in advance.
All day Saturday the weather was mild
and balmy, with scarcely enough breeze
to float the Storm Signal flag, which was
run upon the flag pole early that morning
and throughout the day, which was one
of sunshine here, the flag hung drooping-
ly to the pole, which caused many to ask
where the storm could be. Late Satur-
day evening, however, the rain drops
commenced to fall and still later in the
night the wind and the rain came to-
gether in heavy gusts and all day yester-
day (Sunday) the same state of weather
continued, rendering a comfortable seat in
doors by a snug fire the most delight-
ful thing of the season. Late last night,
however, there was a lower tempera-
ture, the rain ceased to fall, but was sup-
planted by a few flakes of snow, then
again the rain succeeded the snow, accom-
panied with much wind, until about 7
o'clock this morning when a real snow
storm set in which lasted for several
hours, but the ground having been wet
the snow melted as fast as it fell to the
earth. About 10 o'clock there came a
mixture of sleet and snow, making it ex-
ceedingly disagreeable for pedestrians
and wayfarers.
From Sergeant Watson's at the Signal
office, we learn that the storm extended
North of Hatteras as far as Kitty Hawk
on this coast. From the same source we
also learn that the wind at Smithville
only reached a velocity of eighteen miles.
The steamship Raleigh, which cleared
from this port on Saturday and sailed on
Sunday morning, remained at anchor in
Smithville Harbor. The Regulator,
which cleared also for New York, left
here twenty-four hours earlier than the
Raleigh and went to sea by 9 o'clock
Saturday morning. The last named
steamer, however, probably reached
Lookout in time to get in under the
lee of that promontory, where she, no
doubt, rode out the gale in safety. We
are happy to be able to state that so far
there are no casualties reported although
the storm was a pretty severe Northeas-
ter.

They Are Coming.
About twenty timber rafts arrived
here yesterday and to-day and it is said
that there are fifty-five more, already
heard of, besides others of which no ad-
vices have yet been received, on the way
here. They come in the main from points

for many months.

November Meteors.
During the past few days the earth
has been passing through the meteor
zone, but there has been an absence of the
usual meteoric displays which occur in
this month and in August, although had
there been any during the past two
nights they would not have been visible
here because of the heavy clouds over-
head. An astronomical authority says:
The November meteor zone is made up
of a swarm of particles, following in the
train of Tempel's comet. The swarm of
meteoroids is not equally scattered around
the orbit, but is concentrated in one por-
tion, which the earth crosses once in
about thirty-four years. Then we have
a shower that is something to remember
for a life time. Such a shower is not to
be expected until 1899. In the interval,
unless something extraordinary takes
place, the observer will see few meteors
to reward his gaze, but it is well to be
on the watch when these annual epochs
come round and be ready to enjoy the
sight if any thing unusual occurs.
