Here is a pen and ink sketch of Gen. Mahons, the Alex. Stephens of the next Senate, as the correspondent calls him:

He is a very small man and will probably sink the beam at say ninety odd pounds and in height measures 5 feet 6 inches. The biggest thing about him is his hat. It is a slouch and worn in typical Southern style. His hair, iron gray, is worn rather long, but does not hang way down over the neck. He has a beard and mustache, also iron gray. His right hand is constantly feeling around his beard while he talks. He stands straight and dresses well. He wears black broadcloth or a black coat and gray pants. His vest is unbuttoned all the way down to the last two holes. This shows a length of perfectly white linen. The collar is equally white, but not stiff, and is surrounded by a narrow black tie carefully knotted in front. Around his neck is hung a long gold chain which winds in and out the button-holes of the vest and finally disappears in the watch-pocket. Then there are his feet. They are very small. They are perhaps the narrowest belonging to any man in this country. He is a ready talker and has the Southern accent pretty strongly marked. His voice is weak, that organ being comparatively as small as his feet, but it is rather musical.

The morning and afternoon session of the Convention will be for business, and the discussion of important subjects. Each evening, there will be preaching, or mass meetings, and addresses by distinguished delegates and visitors. ANNUAL MEETINGS

Annual Meeting of the stockholders, of the Wilmington & Weldon R R

The Fifty-fifth Annual Meeting of the Stockholders of the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad was held at the President's office in this city to-day at 11 o'clock: On motion of D. MacRae, Esq., Mr. H. B. Plant, of New York, was called to the Chair, and Mr. J. W. Thompson, of this city, was requested to act as Secretary.

Messrs B. F. Newcomer and Geo. C. Jenkins were appointed, together with the Secretary, a committee to verify proxies.

The committee reported 3,086 shares represented in person and 6,658 by proxy making a total of 9,744 shares. It being ascertained that a majority of the stock was represented, the meeting was declared fully organized for business.

The President read his annual report, which, on motion of Hon. C. H. Brogden, was accepted and approved.

The reports of the Superintendent, Treasurer and Auditor were submitted, but on motion of D. MacRae, Esq., their reading was dispensed with.

Col. J. W. Atkinson, on behalf of the Auditing Committee, read the report of that committee, which, on motion, was received and ordered published with the proceedings of the meeting.

A proposition on the part of citizens of Halifax county, having been made to the Company to furnish cross-ties and the right of way and do the grading for a branch road from the town of Halifax to Clarksville, in that county, if the Company would complete the proposed road, the matter, on motion of Mr. B. F. Newcomer, was referred to the Board of Directors, with power to act.

An application to lease old rails for the purpose of building a temporary track to haul timber, was likewise referred to the Board of Directors with power to act.

Col. J. W. Atkinson then nominated Hon. R. R. Bridgers for reelection to the office of President and moved that a ballot be dispensed with, which was carried and Col. Bridgers was thereupon unanimously reelected.

Messrs. Thos. C. Jenkins, W. T. Walters, B. F. Newcomer and S. M. Shoemaker, of Baltimore; H. B. Plant, of New York; A. J. DeRosset and D. MacRae, of Wilmington; Geo. Howard, of Tarboro; E. B. Borden, of Goldsboro; and W. H. Willard, of Raleigh, were elected a Board of Directors for the ensuing year.

Messrs. J. W. Atkinson, D. Branch and D. G. Worth were appointed Auditing Committee for the same term.

On motion, the meeting adjourned to meet in this city on the first Tuesday after the third Monday in November, 1881.

Annual Meeting of the Stockholders of the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta R. R.

The first annual meeting, after the reorganization, of the stockholders of the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta R. R. was held at the President's office in this city to-day at 12 o'clock.

On motion, H. B. Plant, Esq., was called to the Chair and Mr. J. W. Thompson was requested to act as Secretary.

Messrs B. F. Newcomer and Geo. C. Jenkins were appointed, with the Secretary, a committee to verify proxies and ascertain the amount of stock represented.

The committee reported 1,350 shares represented in person and 4,606 by proxy making a total of 5,956 share.

The President read his annual report which was received and adopted.

Hon. R. R. Bridgers was re-elected President, and Messrs. W. T. Walters, S. M. Shoemaker, B. F. Newcomer, Geo. C. Jenkins, Geo. S. Brown and Enoch Pratt, of Baltimore; H. B. Plant, of New York; J. D. Cameron, of Harrisburg, Pa.; R. R. Bridgers, of Wilmington; and H. B. Short, of Columbus county, were chosen a Board of Directors for the ensuing year.

On motion, the meeting adjourned to meet in this city on the first Tuesday after the third Monday in November, 1881.

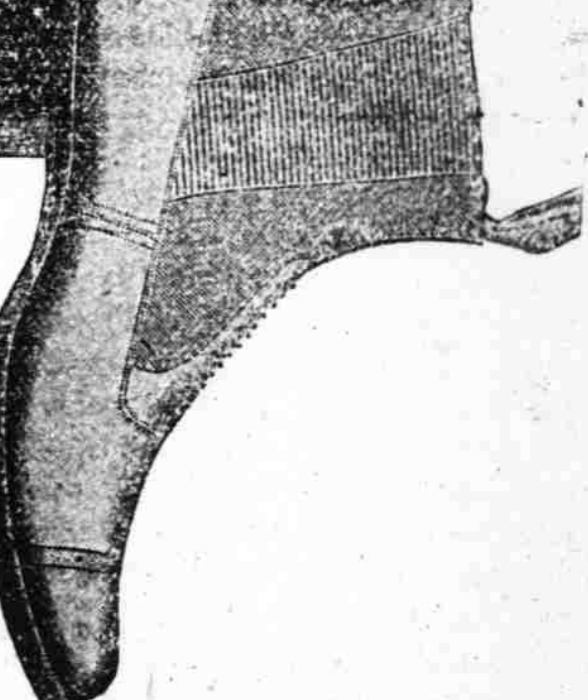
