A Monsieur Loilet has been recently dredging the Sea of Galilee. It has a depth of 250 metres and contains twelve species of fish. The majority of these species have the singular habit of hatching their eggs and sheltering their young in their mouths.

New York City has a total population of 1,206,577, of whom 590,762 are males and 615,815 are females; 727,743 are native and 478,834 foreign born, 1,186,144 are white and 20,433 are colored. There are in the city 747 Chinese, 15 Japanese and 44 Indians, all of whom are included in the report of the colored.

W. H. Vanderbilt owns \$50,000,000 in four per cent. bonds. His income from this source alone is \$2,000,000 a year or over \$6,000 for each working day. Just think of it! There is "many a man," who works hard from daylight until dark, whom it would take twenty years to earn as much money as Vanderbilt's bonds make for him in one day.

About sixteen hundred bills on the calendar, says the *Star*, await Congress at its reassembling in final session. Short work will be made with most of them; they will never become laws. Nearly a thousand of the number are individual benefit bills; and of the public bills many can be grouped within the regular appropriations of real importance.

The Count de Chambord is about to visit the Duke of Norfolk at Arundel Castle, where immense preparations are to be made for his reception. One of the motives of this visit to England is said to be to confer with the Catholic authorities as to the settlement of the religious communities driven from France.

Forney, commenting in the *Philadelphia Progress* on the result of the election, says that "we now face the empire, and there is but one great force to meet it—the Democratic party. Garfield only fills the gap for Grant. I write this name with a new feeling, that of profound regret that one, I love so well should sink so low. First the defender of the forgotten South, then its defamer. First eager to honor Hancock for his virtues, then to hound him as an enemy. And this is the man who wants to play the part of King hereafter."

The finest sugar crop that was ever raised in Louisiana, says an exchange, is now being gathered. The yield will be fifty per cent. beyond the average. The use of proper fertilizers and careful cultivation has improved and increased the sugar as well as the cotton crop in the South. Hitherto an average yield of one hoghead to the acre has been considered good, but this year it will not be less than one and a half hogheads. On some plantations three hogheads per acre are being gathered. The unusually large crop has had the effect of reducing the price of raw sugar from one to two cents per pound below the price last year.

The Raleigh *Star* publishes the result of the canvass of the vote for Electors, by the State Board of Canvassers, for the State at Large. Busbee, Democrat, has a majority of 8,588 and Leach, Democrat, 8,206. Koonce and Davis, Greenbackers, got but 1,126 votes in the entire State. In the First district the Democratic ticket has a majority of 7,574; in the Second the Democrats (?) have 7,176; in the Third, Dan Hugh McLean, our gallant young standard bearer, has 7,600 votes; both Watts and Wooten; in the Fourth the Democratic majority is 19,057; in the Fifth it is 21,832; in the Sixth it is 7,455; in the Seventh it is 7,397; and in the Eighth it is 7,425. Hancock's majority over Garfield is 8,588; his plurality over Republicans and Greenbackers is 7,640. There were some scattering votes for Electors, W. A. Smith having received 12,320, John W. Hardin 15,095 and J. M. Davis 55.

Shipped Foreign.

The German barques *Carl Max* and *Erna* cleared to-day for Liverpool with cargoes of cotton, shipped by Messrs. Williams & Murchison. The former takes out 1,159 bales and the latter 2,458, a total of 3,617 bales.

Bishop Keane.

The Right Reverend Bishop Keane, of Richmond, Va., will administer the Sacrament and Confirmation and deliver a sermon, at St. Thomas' Church to-morrow, at 10:30 a. m., and will preach again in the evening at 7:30 o'clock. We understand that there are 38 candidates to be presented for confirmation. Bishop Keane has been in North Carolina for more than a week past, and has served in Hickory, Charlotte, Raleigh and Columbia. He is the guest, while here, of Col. F. W. Kerchner.

Disagreeable!

This has been one of the most disagreeable days we remember to have ever experienced. Early this morning there began a steady downpour of rain and it was kept up until noon. At one time there was a thunder storm raging and this was peculiar from the fact that the wind was at that time from the North. The wind shifted very rapidly, at one time blowing from the North, then from the Northeast, then from the West and then again from the East. The rainfall here between 7:30 and 12:30 o'clock, was 1.42 inches and at Smithville, during the same period, it was 1.30 inches.

In Port and to Arrive.

There are now in this port 29 vessels, over 80 tons burthen; 16 barques, 2 brigs and 11 schooners. Of the barques 1 is British, 1 Danish, 5 German, and 9 Norwegian; of the brigs, 1 is Norwegian and 1 British. Of the schooners, 1 is British and 10 are American.

There are 38 vessels, all foreigners, bound for this port. Of these 27 are barques, 10 are brigs and 1 is a schooner. Of the barques 18 are Norwegian, 6 are German, 1 is Swedish, 1 is Danish and 1 is Russian. Of the brigs 6 are German, 3 are Norwegian and 1 is of a nationality not stated. The schooner is British.

A Caution About Shot in Game.

The London *Lancet* publishes the following: This being the season when game killed by shot, and probably containing the pellets, is eaten, it may be worth while to caution those who consume the flesh of birds with avidity that the proportion of instances in which shot is found is probably small in comparison with the number of cases in which the pellets are unwittingly swallowed. It is a matter of speculation how much mischief a shot may do when it is passed into the intestines, but the fact that anomalous diseases have been set up by the presence of very small particles which have been entangled in folds of the mucous membrane renders it desirable to put the public on their guard. Occasionally the most disastrous results have followed such small causes. We have in recollection the case of a physician who died after prolonged and unexplained sufferings from the impaction of a very small nail which had found its way into a pudding and was inadvertently swallowed. A little care will avoid this contingency; but, remembering that the bird had been shot, some pains ought certainly to be taken to avoid swallowing the missile.

Another illustrated article, "Our Grandfathers' Temples," is a very readable account of the oldest places of worship still existing in the country. "The Authors of Froufrou," has a timely interest in connection with Sara Bernhardt's performances. Other papers deserving of notice are "Gas-Burning and its Consequences," "An Episode of Spanish Chivalry," the conclusion of Dr. H. C. Wood's exposition of "Automatism," and a contribution to Shakesperian studies by Prof. James D. Butler. The popular serial, "Adam and Eve," reaches a dramatic and satisfactory termination in this number, which also contains several striking stories, including a thoroughly realistic sketch of Edinburgh street life. The "Monthly Gossip" is unusually full and entertaining. With the January number this Magazine will enter on a new series, at a reduced price and with the promise of greater attractiveness and wider claims to popularity.

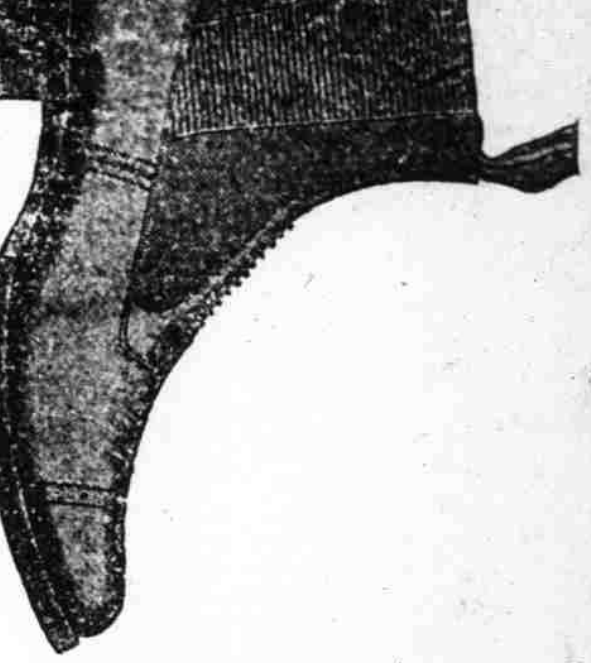
