A Strike Among the Steamship Steve

dores. The usual quiet and good order of the New York and Wilmington Steamship wharf was disturbed this morning upon the arrival of the steamship Regulator at her wharf by some fifteen or twenty colored men, who are regularly employed

to take out cargo and stow the ship, refusing to work unless they received an increase of pay. This Mr. Bend, the Superintendent, refused peremptorily to do, whereupon the strikers left the yard. The regular pay of these men, we have been told, is \$1.50 per day and they are found at engaged to work at that place whenever a steamer is in port the whole year round. Their demand was for \$2.00 per day, which, as before stated, the Superintendent refused to accede to, but went Pens and Penelle, from Mabie, Todal & Co. to work immediately and engaged other men to take the place of the strikers at the same price which had always been paid. There was little or no time lost in unloading the steamer, as the new gang of hands, under the same boss stevedores went to work at once. We understand that Mr. Bond, the Superintendent caused a notice to be stuck up on the premises, forbidding the employment any of the strikers in future at any price


