AGAIN IN FLAMES.

Another Diest ous Incendiary Fire In Laurinburg - Only Two Stores Left in the Town

It was but three days ago that we were called upon to chronicle the destruction by fire of a large portion of the fair little town of Laurinburg and now it is our sad duty to record another disaster. Two terrible incendiary fires in one week have swept away almost the entire business portion of the town, there being but two stores now left standing, those of Messrs. Fountain & Co. and Everett Gill & Co.

This second fire occurred last night, between 12 and 1 o'clock, and there is no doubt of its incendiary origin.

It originated in Mr. H. F. Northrop's saloon and it is thought that the motive in this instance, as in the other, was plunder. Before the flames could be stayed Northrop's saloon, Dr. R. D. Dickson's office, the postoffice, one dwelling, one stable and six stores were consumed: Fortunately, the contents of all of the buildings were saved, with the exception of a few barrels of liquor. The loss will amount to about \$5,000, probably one-half of which was insured. The railroad depot, shops and other property are uninjured.
