entered by the north aisle and marched

AGAIN IN FLAMES.

Another Disaster Incendiary Fire
In Laurinburg—Only Two Stores
Left in the Town

It was but three days ago that we were
called upon to chronicle the destruction
by fire of a large portion of the fair little
town of Laurinburg and now it is our
sad duty to record another disaster.
Two terrible incendiary fires in one week
have swept away almost the entire busi-
ness portion of the town, there being but
two stores now left standing, those of
Messrs. Fountain & Co. and Everett,
Gill & Co.

This second fire occurred last night,
between 12 and 1 o'clock, and there is no
doubt of its incendiary origin.

It originated in Mr. H. F. Northrop's
saloon and it is thought that the motive
in this instance, as in the other, was
plunder. Before the flames could be
stayed Northrop's saloon, Dr. R. D.
Dickson's office, the postoffice, one
dwelling, one stable and six stores were
consumed. Fortunately, the contents of
all of the buildings were saved, with the
exception of a few barrels of liquor. The
loss will amount to about \$5,000, prob-
ably one-half of which was insured. The
railroad depot, shops and other property
are uninjured.

The fire on last Tuesday morning was
on the East side of Main street and that
last night was on the West side. Two
of the sufferers by the first fire, Messrs.
D. A. McAllister and McCaskill & Mc-
Lean, had removed their effects across the
street into another store and were again
routed last night.

Wood and Wood Dealers.

There is one matter of considerable
interest to all classes of our citizens, and
they should have some protection. We
allude to the wood which is brought to
this market for sale. It seldom comes
up to the requirements of the law as re-
gards its length, and when sold is never
measured. It is simply thrown from the
flat upon a dray until the seller tells the
drayman that he has a load. The short
quarter of a cord that is daily seen on
drays in this city is often commented
upon by observing persons. A purchas-
er buys a fourth of a cord, but seldom
gets a fifth. Something should be done
to protect citizens in this matter of wood.
There was at one time an ordinance
which required all wood sold here to be
inspected and measured. Why is it not
in force now?
