City Court.
There were three cases before His Honor this morning.

Incipient Fire.
A dwelling house on Second street was discovered to be on fire a few mornings ago. The fire caught from a red-hot stove pipe which was passed through a division wall and across a room to a chimney. The damage was light as the fire was discovered in its incipency. Had it not been discovered as early as it was the city might have been visited with a terrible conflagration as the house is a three story frame building and surrounded by a nest of frame buildings.

Cotton Thieves Come to Grief.
For some time past cotton has been systematically stolen from the wharf of the Champion Compress Company, often whole bales being taken off at a time. The gentlemen in charge of the Compress were cognizant of the loss, but said nothing until they had sufficient evidence against the thieves to convict them. Having worked up the case, warrants were gotten out on Wednesday last and five colored men and one white man have been arrested up to today. Two others are known to be implicated in the robberies but the supposition is that they are birds of passage on route for new fields. At the request of the white man we withhold the names until after the preliminary examination before a magistrate which will take place on Saturday morning next. There seems to have been a regular organized band of cotton thieves who have been operating along the wharves for the past month.

About two weeks ago, a bale of cotton was stolen from the Champion Compress wharf, and search in a quiet way was immediately made, but at that time nothing was elicited which would lead to the detection of the thieves. On the following night another bale was stolen. It was eased into the river and floated down to Messrs. Worth & Worth's naval store yard and tied under the wharf. At other times cotton has been stolen by the bale and frequently bags have been cut open and from forty to fifty pounds taken out. We have the particulars of the different robberies but for obvious reasons will not ventilate them until after the trial. This gang are not the only ones who have been stealing the staple. On Friday last a gentleman in the employ of the company caught a colored man in the act and after a scuffle led the thief off with a view of turning him over to a policeman but when near the Water street entrance to the press the man seized a favorable opportunity and jerked away from his captor and then fought his way into the street when he gave leg bail. We learn that the Company have lost about ten bales of cotton but have succeeded in getting most of it back.

Narrow Escape.

While on a pleasure trip down the river on the steamer *Passport*, a few days ago, a lady made a narrow escape from being burned to death. She, in company with two or three of her female friends, was sitting on the deck, when a gentleman, who was some distance from her, discovered that her dress and skirts were in a light blaze. With great presence of mind, he gave no alarm, but hurriedly grabbing the burning garments in his arms, smothered them with the frock of his coat before the imperiled lady was aware of her danger. A place about the size of a water-bucket was burnt through her overskirt, dress and skirt. It is thought that her clothing became ignited from a match which a gentleman had lighted his cigar with and then thoughtlessly and carelessly thrown down. The wind was blowing fresh at the time and a minute later the lady would undoubtedly have been enveloped in flames.
