Called Meeting of the Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met in called session this morning, at 10 o'clock, all of the Board being present. The Mayor stated that he had called the Board together for the purpose of getting the views of the Aldermen relative to the sale of the old Market, as to whether it should be sold at public auction or by sealed bids.

Alderman Myers offered the following resolution which was adopted:
Resolved, That the sale of the old Market House advertised for to-day be withdrawn and that sealed bids be advertised for the purchase and sale of same as it now stands, the building to be removed by or before January 7th, 1881, and that the bids be opened at a meeting of this Board on or before the 20th inst. the city reserving the right to reject all bids.

The Board then adjourned.

A Confidence Man Felled.

That there are some sharp, shrewd and bold thieves in this city admits of no doubt, and the citizens should be ever on their guard for them.
