One Day's Trade.

About three hundred colored laborers, from away down in Georgia, where they have been working in turpentine during the past year, arrived here on Sunday morning last en route for their homes in various parts of the State. They stopped over here on Sunday and as they were flush with money and anxious to buy, a number of our enterprising merchants made a virtue of necessity and accommodated them by throwing open their doors. Lots of goods changed hands on that day and it is estimated that \$5,000 in all was spent here on Sunday. A prominent house took in about \$1,100 and in another house one buyer alone spent upwards of \$150. We are sorry that it was necessary to do this trading on Sunday but we are not sorry that such a snug little sum has been added to the amount of circulating medium in this city.

Opera House.

We have seldom seen an audience in Wilmington more enmeshed in their attention to a theatrical performance than was the large crowd assembled at the Opera House last night to witness the performance of the farcical comedy entitled "The Governor." The piece is one entirely different from the usual run, and excited more than ordinary interest on that account. The acting was good in all the various parts, each character being well sustained throughout the entire play. Mr. Barton Hill, as Freddy Butterscotch, won the audience to him from his first appearance, and carried them right along all the way through the piece.

Mr. H. C. Curly, as the Old Boat Builder, whose very great deafness prevented him from understanding anything correctly, was highly amusing in his part. Miss Bockel, as Kate, found much favor with the audience, did also Mrs. Rouse, whose acting was very good.

The audience, as well as the actors, were at one time very seriously disturbed and annoyed by disorderly behavior in the galleries, but this was very promptly checked, we are happy to say, at once, by both the Mayor and Chief of Police, who were present in the audience; it was only momentary, when everything went on as usual.
